By leave of the House, the Hon. G. V. Lauk (Minister of Industrial Development, Trade, and Commerce) tabled General Development Agreement dated the 28th of March 1974, made between the Government of Canada and the Government of the Province of British Columbia.

By leave of the House, the Hon. *Norman Levi* (Minister of Human Resources) tabled the following:

Reasons for judgment of the Court of Appeal in the matter of the *Adoption Act* and in the matter of birth registration No. 67-09-022272.

A survey of adoption and child welfare services to Indians of British Columbia.

- 60 Mr. Wallace asked the Hon. the Premier the following questions:
  - With respect to the expansion of the British Columbia Railway system-
- 1. What routes does the BCR plan to extend and, in each case, by how many miles, to what locations, by what times, and at what estimated cost?
- 2. Of the route extensions mentioned in No. 1, (a) which ones will be accomplished by building new BCR tracks, (b) which ones will be jointly constructed by the BCR and any other railways, and (c) which ones will require the acquisition by the BCR of running rights over the track of any other railways?

The Hon. David Barrett replied as follows:

- "1. The British Columbia Railway Company is in the process of extending its line by 420 miles, from Fort St. James to Dease Lake; estimated completion date is summer 1976; estimated cost is \$165 million.
  - "2. (a) All of them, (b), and (c) none, under negotiation."
- 88 Mr. Curtis asked the Hon. the Minister of Finance the following questions: With respect to the \$25,000,000 Green Belt Protection Fund Act introduced by the former Government in February 1972—
- 1. What is the total amount of money spent under the Act between March 1, 1973, and the latest date for which figures are available?

2. What is the location and price paid with respect to each acquisition in the period stated in No. 1?

The Hon. David Barrett replied as follows:

"1. \$765,294.78 (March 1, 1973, to January 31, 1974).

"2. (a) Lots 4 and 5 of east half of the southwest quarter of Section 22, Township 14, Plan 12970, NWD, \$107,450.

"(b) Lot 6, DL 580A, Plan 1775, SDYD, \$122,000.

- "(c) District Lots 10343 and 10345, Parcel 2 of Parcel A of District Lot 8103. Parcel 1 of Parcel A of District Lot 8103, that part of District Lot 10344 and that part of District Lot 7003 described as follows: That part of District Lot 8103 and District Lot 7003 lying east of a line drawn from the midpoint of the southern boundary of District Lot 10344 due south of the north boundary of the Wolf Creek Road (all of (c) in the Kootenay District), \$195,000.
- "(d) Block B, except the right-of-way included in Plan DD 14911, Parcel 1 (Reference Plan 584291), and portions included in Plans 5262 and 5830 in District Lot 129, Kootenay District, Plan 816, \$185,000.
- "(e) The southeast quarter of Sublot 8, except those parts shown outlined in red on Reference Plan 952671, District Lot 328, Kootenay District, Plan X40; the north half of the southwest quarter of Sublot 8 of District Lot 328, Kootenay District, Plan X40. Except thereout: firstly, that part subdivided by Plan 4347; and secondly, that part thereof which lies to the west of Lot 1, Plan 4347, and to the north of the westerly prolongation of the southerly boundary of said Lot 1; Blocks 127 and 128 of District Lot 328, Kootenay District, Plan 1171; Block 130, except thereout Parcel 1 (Sketch Plan 25831 and DD 58251) of District Lot 328, Kootenay District, Plan 1171; Lot 129 of District Lot 328, Kootenay District, Plan X40, \$165,000.

"In addition to the property acquisitions described in (c), (d), and (e), certain grazing leases, grazing permits, water licences, and irrigation equipment were also acquired.

"(f) Miscellaneous expenditures on property taxes and insurance, \$13,826.64.

"(g) Repayment on uncompleted purchase, \$22,981.86."

# 141 Mr. Curtis asked the Hon. the Minister of Finance the following questions:

With respect to the provisions for the payment of certain types of taxes by or on behalf of several Government-controlled enterprises, namely, (i) Ocean Falls Corporation, (ii) Plateau Mills Limited, (iii) Vancouver Island Coach Lines, (iv) Kootenay Forest Products Limited, and (v) Pacific Poultry Producers Co-operative Association—

- 1. (a) What type of tax, (b) what amount of tax, or (c) what amount of grants in lieu of tax was paid to any municipal government in the most recent taxyear for which applicable information is available?
- 2. (a) What type of tax, (b) what amount of tax, or (c) what amount of grants in lieu of tax was paid to the Provincial Government in the most recent tax-year for which applicable information is available?
- 3. (a) What type of tax, (b) what amount of tax, or (c) what amount of grants in lieu of tax was paid to the Federal Government in the most recent tax-year for which applicable information is available?

The Hon. David Barrett replied as follows:

1. (a) Local and school property taxes; (b) \$264.32 in 1973 by Plateau Mills Limited, Ocean Falls Corporation owns no property within municipalities.

1973 property taxes of Kootenay Forest Products Limited were paid by the previous owners; and (c) nil.

- "2. (a) Provincial, school, and other local government property taxes, social services tax, motor-fuel taxes, fuel oil tax, cigarette and tobacco tax, hotel and motel room tax, and logging tax; Crown corporations are exempt from Provincial income and corporation capital taxes; (b) 1973 property taxes on acquisitions of Ocean Falls Corporation were paid by the previous owner; Plateau Mills Limited paid \$44,883.08 in taxes levied on the 1973 Provincial property tax roll; returns on consumption taxes do not allow the determination of taxes paid by individual consumers; 1973 logging tax instalment of \$1,625.21 received from Plateau Mills Limited; Ocean Falls Corporation return not yet filed; Provincial income and corporation capital taxes for non-Crown corporations not known at this date; and (c) nil.
- "3. (a) Income tax, if less than 90 per cent Crown ownership, and sales tax; (b) information not available; and (c) not known.

"Note—Vancouver Island Coach Lines and Pacific Poultry Producers Cooperative Association are not Government-controlled enterprises. Kootenay Forest Products Limited was not acquired by the Province until February 20, 1974."

**172** Mr. *McClelland* asked the Hon. the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Director of B.C. Hydro the following questions:

With respect to any disposal of assets by B.C. Hydro at Jordan River, Vancouver Island—

- 1. Was there a sale without tender of any assets?
- 2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, (a) what assets were sold, (b) what was the total price received by B.C. Hydro, (c) was the penstock and powerhouse included in the sale and, if so, at what price, (d) to whom was the powerhouse and penstock sold, (e) was any other offer received or refused, (f) is the Alaska Junk Company, Seattle, involved in any way with either the purchase or removal of any assets sold, and (g) how many Canadian citizens and how many American citizens are involved with any removal work?

## The Hon. J. G. Lorimer replied as follows:

"1. A contract was entered into without tender with Davis Holdings Limited; this contract covered the sale of certain items and also the performance of certain work by the contractor.

"The contractor undertook—(i) to remove from the site the following items: Four generator units, three exciters, four banks of transformers, four penstocks, two cranes, miscellaneous supporting items, spare parts, and tools relating to the above; (ii) to pay to B.C. Hydro \$60,000 for the items in (i); (iii) to separate, preserve, and deliver to B.C. Hydro 19 equipment items of historical interest for use in a power museum; and (iv) to restore the site following the removal of all equipment and material.

"2. (a) The assets sold to the contractor are those listed in No. 1 (i); (b) in addition to the payment of \$60,000, B.C. Hydro received the value of the other work performed by the contractor as described in No. 1; (c) the powerhouse building was not sold and the items of penstocks and powerhouse equipment are listed in No. 1, the contractor is not entitled to the items mentioned in No. 1 (iii); (d) the items listed in No. 1 (i) were sold to Davis Holdings Limited; (e) no; (f) not to B.C. Hydro's knowledge; and (g) not known."

And then the House adjourned at 6.03 p.m.
