#### A PROCLAMATION

Now Know YE, that for divers causes and considerations and taking into consideration the ease and convenience of Our Loving subjects, We have thought fit to hereby convoke, and by these presents enjoin you, and each of you, that on Tuesday, the seventeenth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and ninety-two at two o'clock in the afternoon, you meet Us in Our said Legislature or Parliament, of Our said Province, at Our City of Victoria, FOR THE DISPATCH OF BUSINESS, to treat, do, act, and conclude upon those things which, in Our Legislature of the Province of British Columbia, by the Common Council of Our said Province may, by the favour of God, be ordained.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent and the Great Seal of Our Province to be hereunto affixed.

WITNESS, the Honourable DAVID C. LAM, Lieutenant Governor of Our Province of British Columbia, in Our City of Victoria, in Our Province, this twenty-fifth day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and ninety-two, and in the forty-first year of Our Reign.

Tuesday, March 17, 1992

Two o'clock P.M.

This being the first day of the first meeting of the Thirty-fifth Parliament or Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia for the dispatch of business, pursuant to a Proclamation of the Honourable David C. Lam, Lieutenant Governor of the Province, dated the 25th day of February 1992, the members took their seats, after having taken the prescribed oath and having signed the Parliamentary Roll.

The Honourable DAVID C. LAM, Lieutenant Governor of the Province, having entered the House, took his seat on the Throne.

The Hon. C. Gabelmann, Attorney General, said: Members of the Legislative Assembly:

I am commanded by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor to announce that he does not see fit to declare the cause of his summoning you at this time and will not do so until you have chosen a Speaker to preside over your Honourable Body. His Honour the Lieutenant Governor hopes to be enabled to declare, during the afternoon, his reason for calling you together.

His Honour was then pleased to retire.

The Hon. *G. Clark*, addressing himself to the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, moved, seconded by Mr. *Mitchell* and Mr. *Weisgerber*, that *Joan Sawicki*, Member for Burnaby-Willingdon Electoral District, do take the Speaker's Chair and preside over the meetings of this Assembly, and it was so *Resolved*.

*Ian M. Horne*, Q.C., Clerk of the House, having declared *Joan Sawicki* duly elected, she was then taken out of her place by the mover and seconders and conducted to the Chair, where, standing on the upper step, she expressed her grateful thanks to the House for the great honour they had been pleased to confer upon her by choosing her to be their Speaker.

And thereupon she sat down in the Chair, and the mace was laid upon the table.

Prayers by Reverend Heather Lindstedt.

The letter of the Deputy Attorney General and the certificate of the Chief Electoral Officer of the result of the election of members to represent the respective electoral districts of the Province in the Legislative Assembly at the general election were read by *E. On the motion of the Hon. C. Gabelmann, it was Ordered —

That the letter of the Deputy Attorney General and the certificate of the Chief Electoral Officer of the result of the election of members be entered on the Journals of the House.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor again entered the House and took his seat on the Throne. The Speaker, standing on His Honour's right, then spoke to the following effect:

#### MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

The House of Assembly has elected me as their Speaker, though I am but little able to fulfill the important duties thus assigned to me. If, in the performance of those duties, I should at any time fall into error, I pray that the fault be imputed to me, and not to the Assembly, whose servant I am, and who, through me, the better to enable them to discharge their duty to the Queen and country, humbly claim all their undoubted rights and privileges, especially that they may have the freedom of speech in their debates, access to Your Honour's person at all seasonable times, and that their proceedings may receive from Your Honour the most favourable interpretation.

The Hon. C. Gabelmann then said:

#### MADAM SPEAKER:

I am commanded by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor to declare to you that he freely confides in the duty and attachment of the House of Assembly to Her Majesty's person and Government, and not doubting that their respective proceedings will be conducted with wisdom, temper and prudence, he grants, and upon all occasions will recognize and allow, their constitutional privileges. I am commanded also to assure you that the Assembly shall have ready access to His Honour the Lieutenant Governor upon all seasonable occasions, and that their proceedings, as well as your words and actions, will constantly receive from him the most favourable construction.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor was then pleased to open the Session by the following gracious Speech:

Madame Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly, Ladies and Gentlemen:

I extend greetings on behalf of our Sovereign, Her Majesty the Queen, on the opening of this First Session of the Thirty-fifth Parliament of British Columbia.

I invite all of you to join me in wishing Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second well as we celebrate the fortieth anniversary of her accession to the Throne.

Last October the people of British Columbia exercised their democratic right in electing a new Government and Official Opposition. I would like to congratulate all members of the new Assembly, and to welcome those forty-eight sitting as Members of the Legislature for the first time. I trust that each of you stands ready to serve and act in the best interests of the people of our Province.

Since last meeting, we have been saddened by the passing of two former Members of this Legislature, Grace MacInnis and William Murray. Grace MacInnis, whose remarkable career included her election as the first woman Member of Parliament from British Columbia, represented Vancouver-Burrard in this House from 1941 to 1945, and Vancouver Kingsway in the House of Commons from 1965 to 1974. She was also a Member of the Order of British Columbia. William Murray was first elected to represent Prince Rupert in 1956 and proudly served as Speaker of the Legislative Assembly from 1964 to 1972.

Our Province has entertained numerous distinguished guests over the past year. Just recently we were honoured by a visit from His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh. Among the other dignitaries visiting our province were President Roh, of the Republic of Korea; Her Majesty Queen Margrethe II of Denmark; and President G ncz, of the Republic of Hungary. The Government was also pleased to receive many diplomatic representatives accredited to Canada.

It was my great pleasure to participate in the second investiture of the Order of British Columbia, which took place at Government House last June. Seventeen outstanding British Columbians were recognized for their efforts and contributions toward the betterment of our Province.

Madame Speaker and Honourable Members, when this Government sought its mandate from the people of British Columbia, it promised no miracles. It committed that it would do no more than British Columbians could afford and would manage our province's finances openly and responsibly.

In the coming weeks, this Assembly will be asked to consider the Government's revenue and expenditure intentions. The many difficult choices that will face all Members reflect the reality lived daily by all British Columbians.

We will all be asked to carry our fair share of the work as we confront the challenges of our fiscal situation, and build on our strengths as a people and the opportunities of our strong trading economy.

This Government has now begun within the financial limitations imposed upon it to take action on the priorities it laid before British Columbians five months ago.

#### **Ensuring Open Government**

When the Cabinet was sworn in last November, I reminded its Members they must begin by restoring the confidence of the people of British Columbia in their Government. Steps have already been taken to earn that trust. There will be new initiatives during this session to ensure that Government is open and honest.

For the first time in British Columbia, public access to many previously restricted Government documents will be clearly defined through a new *Freedom of Information and Privacy Act*. This legislation will ensure new openness and greater accountability by Government to the people of British Columbia, while protecting individual privacy. We will devote significant Government resources to making it work, starting with the better management of Government records.

In keeping with this commitment to openness, this Government began its mandate by providing the Opposition and the media with briefings on the state of our Province's finances, and by promptly releasing the Public Accounts for the previous fiscal year rather than waiting for the spring legislative sitting.

As a further step toward honest accounting, this Government commissioned a comprehensive and independent financial review so that all taxpayers would have a clear and factual picture of their Government's bank account. The findings of this review were recently shared with the people of British Columbia.

In addition to underlining the need to be open and responsible about our Province's finances, this independent review confirmed the existence of over 12,000 men and women not included in the official Government employee count. We have appointed a commission of inquiry to propose steps for treating these employees fairly while ensuring taxpayers get value for their money.

The people of British Columbia rightfully expect the highest standard of ethics from the Cabinet and all Members of the Legislative Assembly. This Government will introduce amendments during this session to strengthen the *Members' Conflict of Interest Act*, as a first step toward establishing the toughest and fairest law of its kind in Canada.

We will also establish an independent mechanism for reviewing salaries, benefits, pensions and severance for MLAs. I am confident that Members of this House will be pleased to devolve this responsibility at a time when so many people are being asked to limit their own expectations.

Open Government also demands that people be included in decision-making, especially when it affects their economic well-being. Since the start of the year, the new Commission on Resources and Environment has been given the important task of building a comprehensive land use strategy for our province through an open planning process. Public discussion is also underway on provincial strategies for economic development, including the coal industry and labour relations.

We will also take positive steps to more effectively include all Members of the Legislature in decision-making. We will seek to expand the roles of Committees of this House in areas such as the consideration of legislation, the Government's spending estimates, and the recall and initiative measures mandated in the October 17th referendum vote.

There is no better example of a non-partisan, consultative approach than the work already undertaken by this new Legislative Assembly through the establishment in January of an all-party Committee on the Constitution. Of the many important tasks before us, few can be more critical than to make our contribution to a strong, united Canada by giving the people of British Columbia a voice in the future of our country.

The principle of open Government will also apply to the office and role of the Premier. The Premier will take further action to ensure that the people of British Columbia have access to their leadership and opportunities to express their concerns directly.

In keeping with this approach, business, labour, and other concerned groups will be invited to participate during mid-June in the *Premier's Summit on Trade and Economic Opportunity*. Those who attend this working session will take part in open discussion and frank sharing of views, including those of this Government, on ways British Columbia can realize its full potential in the world economy.

This Government also recognizes the need for greater public scrutiny, and recourse for individuals, when they believe their Government has let them down. Even the best efforts toward openness and equity can prove imperfect. In that regard, I am sure all Members of the House join me in commending Stephen Owen for the respect and trust his office and staff have earned over the past five years. It is now time to expand the Ombudsman's jurisdiction. This Government will broaden that mandate, to ensure the public has recourse from unfair arbitrary action by municipalities, regional districts, school boards, universities and hospitals.

#### **Putting People First**

This Government has made its priorities clear. We will carry out our commitment to economic prosperity and diversity as the best way to help pay for British Columbia's quality social, health and educational programs.

While we start from a position of confidence in the immense potential of our province, we also acknowledge the challenge posed by the deficit inherited by this Government. As reported by the independent financial review, the provincial deficit for 1991/92 is expected to reach two-and-one-half billion dollars. If spending and revenue patterns are not changed, the deficit is likely to increase by an additional three hundred million dollars in the coming fiscal year.

The federal Government's monetary policy, together with the offloading of its deficit onto the provinces, has also cost British Columbia dearly, resulting in 15,000 lost jobs and adding to our own deficit. At the First Ministers' Conference last month, the Premier made it clear that British Columbia is strongly critical of these policies.

The Premier also emphasized that we intend to take the lead in Canada, not only by good fiscal management at home but also by taking action to position our province in the long term for a strong economic future in global trade markets. The Premier has travelled to the Pacific Rim, New York and Europe to deliver that message to the international investment and trading community. The Premier has also taken responsibility for leading the First Ministers' future discussions on international trade. He will also stress these priorities when British Columbia hosts the meeting of Western Canada's Premiers in May.

This Government will work to ensure the widest possible participation in the growth of British Columbia by people in all economic sectors and regions of the province.

We have helped establish the Working Opportunity Fund to encourage investment of employee funds in B.C.-owned businesses throughout our province. Following on this initiative, we will enter into a new venture capital partnership to encourage targeted investments that will diversify local economies.

This Government has shown faith in our agriculture sector and the Okanagan region by making a major investment in the future of the tree fruit industry that includes replanting of new varieties, biological pest control, and market research and development.

We have taken a strong position both nationally and internationally in support of supply management, in recognition of its vital importance to the viability of agriculture in our Province.

This Government will help protect the interests of British Columbians who make their living from the West Coast fishery by increasing our involvement in the management of that resource.

We also believe Government can make a strong contribution to economic opportunity in the course of doing the people's business.

We have negotiated a pilot project with the federal Government to establish a new Canada-British Columbia procurement agreement which gives British Columbia a fair share of federal procurement.

The Purchasing Commission will escalate efforts to ensure British Columbia suppliers, particularly smaller ones, compete successfully for a greater portion of the goods and services purchased by Government, and give priority to those goods and services that help meet environmental objectives.

Included in the mandate of the Cabinet Committee on Crown Corporations, established in December, is recognition that Crown Corporations can generate greater wealth and economic development for our provincial economy.

This Government will create jobs in local and regional economies while making new capital investments in schools and health care. This will begin to move children out of school portables and bring health care closer to home.

We are concerned that every job loss is a family tragedy. This Government will work to address the problems of resource communities, and those facing major adjustments to their local economies. We will reinforce the role of the Job Protection Commissioner, who has been working diligently with businesses and other stakeholders in restructuring rather than simply closing operations. Some 2,300 jobs have been maintained in this way during the course of operations.

This Government will work to achieve balanced, sustainable growth for all of British Columbia's communities. We will place special emphasis on the role of small businesses as generators of employment and diversity in our economy.

The Business Information Centre Program will continue to ensure local access to important information on starting a business, on marketing goods and services, on Government programs and regulations, and on expansion strategy for existing small business.

British Columbia will continue to press the federal Government to finance the operating costs of the TRIUMF-KAON Project, a national science facility in British Columbia, toward which the Province has offered to contribute one-third of the capital costs.

This Government will prepare a new *Ministry of Tourism Act* following consultation with the tourism industry, communities and regions on how best to maximize the social and economic benefits of tourism throughout our Province.

The continued success of our tourism industry depends on a high level of professionalism and service. The Ministry of Tourism will release a "Blueprint for Action on Education and Training" in recognition of the need to encourage worker training within the industry.

As part of the commitment to skills development, we will seek the cooperation of labour and business in advising on labour market and labour force adjustment programs.

Together with these initiatives, we will ensure that our Province protects and maintains its most important investment: its people. This Government believes that a sound economy is inseparable from social equity.

We have already raised the minimum wage and provided better resources to immigrant settlement organizations which meet the special needs of new Canadians settling in British Columbia.

This Government regards it as a duty and priority to maintain the social safety net, especially where it involves children and families. The federal Government's failure to shoulder its responsibility in this area will require increased expenditures as more families and children seek Guaranteed Available Income for Need support.

We will make changes required to improve GAIN programs in light of continued Canada Assistance Plan restrictions and arbitrary changes by the federal Government to unemployment insurance. Regulations will be amended to reduce financial disincentives for income recipients to participate in the workforce. We will also be a partner in a federal Government project to help single parents make the transition from GAIN to employment.

A community panel, appointed last November to carry out a comprehensive public review of family and child services, will report to the Minister of Social Services in the fall of 1992 in preparation for the tabling of new legislation in the spring of 1993. The members of this panel represent diverse backgrounds, including social services professionals, visible minorities and people with disabilities. A similar process is being pursued in cooperation with the Aboriginal community.

In the coming year, this Government will increase the resources devoted to family support services. In addition, we will propose legislative amendments to provide additional options for families, social workers and the court system in child protection matters.

In recognition of the difficult transition faced by older children under permanent guardianship, we will also introduce amendments to allow young people to receive care and support for up to twenty-four months after their eighteenth birthday, if they are enrolled in an educational or training program.

This Government will help relieve the shortage of affordable housing by requiring local Governments to ensure affordable, rental and special needs housing are provided for in their official community plans. We will improve the Government's ability to respond to and resolve tenancy disputes, while initiating a campaign to better inform landlords and tenants of their rights and obligations.

Legal aid expenditures have more than doubled since last year, yet some clients still have difficulty finding a lawyer to take their case. We are determined to improve legal aid services at lower cost.

Putting people first also demands that we take positive steps towards achieving women's equality, while dealing forthrightly with the consequences of gender inequality.

This Government is proud that seven of its portfolios are held by women, the highest representation in British Columbia's history. But we are far from satisfied. We will take every opportunity, as membership of each Government board is changed, to improve the balance of gender representation in these public bodies.

Since the Government assumed office, the Minister of Women's Equality has provided community groups with more than \$500,000 for support programs for victims of abuse and assault, public awareness, health care, and pre-employment training.

The *Limitation Act* will be amended to exempt cases of abuse from the normal two-year limit for reporting personal injury, in recognition of the long-term traumatic effect of these crimes which often prevents plaintiffs from taking action in the required time-frame.

This Government has also provided stabilization funding for 28 community women's centres across the province, and will commit over one million dollars to support their operations in the coming fiscal year.

This Government respects a woman's right to make her own choice, and will take positive steps to improve access to abortion services in British Columbia.

We will ask all parties in this Assembly to help end the discriminatory wage gap between men and women in the workplace by considering legislation that sets a framework for pay equity in the public sector.

We will work to improve child care programs, particularly for low income parents. Our Province must move ahead in this area despite the federal Government's abrogation of an eight-year-old promise of a national child care program.

To reinforce these measures, legislation will be introduced to establish Canada's first stand-alone Ministry of Women's Equality.

#### **Providing Government That is Fair and Balanced**

This Government will work to give the people of British Columbia fair and balanced Government. During this session we will take action to restore equity in labour relations, taxation, human rights, and the Government's relations with Aboriginal people.

In February, this Government began work on a process to establish an industrial policy institute. This institute will provide a common base of information to enable labour, business and Government to reach consensus on those strategies which will maximize economic opportunities for the people of British Columbia.

A review of the *Industrial Relations Act* is being carried out, with the goal of establishing fair labour laws this Session, to balance the interests of business and the rights of working people.

We will restore the right of free collective bargaining in the public sector by repealing the *Compensation Fairness Act*, and will review the *Employment Standards Act* to ensure working men and women are treated fairly in all areas of the workforce.

We will implement a fair wage policy for all public sector capital construction, which includes a requirement for a certificate of apprenticeship or qualification, and a proper ratio of apprentices to supervising tradespersons. This policy will place all contractors on an equal footing to compete on management ability and expertise, and promote stability and quality in the construction industry.

British Columbia's tax system must also be made fair. This Government has inherited a fiscal problem of major dimensions, which must be dealt with through a balance of reduced growth in spending and higher revenues. Action to address our fiscal imbalance must result in a fair distribution of the tax burden.

We will amend the *Municipal Act* and *Assessment Act* to stabilize property taxation through periods of rapidly changing real estate values.

This Government is also firm in its determination to ensure fair treatment of all residents of our province in a way that reflects the diversity of our society and respect for human rights.

We recognize Aboriginal title and the inherent rights of Aboriginal people to self-Government. An agreement to establish a new Treaty Commission has been negotiated, and we are pleased it has received the approval of this Government and the First Nations Summit Chiefs.

This Government is committed to negotiation to settle issues with Aboriginal people. We are working to support initiatives to encourage self-sufficiency in Aboriginal communities while developing joint stewardship arrangements with First Nations to provide for cooperation on the management of resources prior to treaty negotiations. The third party consultation process is being strengthened to ensure all interests are heard and considered.

This Government will introduce proposed new heritage conservation legislation designed to protect and enhance British Columbia's unique culture and heritage. We are committed to ensuring that Aboriginal peoples participate fully in the development of this legislation.

We will introduce legislative changes to expand the prohibition of discrimination on the basis of age and, for the first time, on the basis of family status and sexual orientation. Other amendments will enable class action complaints to deal with systemic discrimination issues, and remove the limit on general damages payable to those whose human rights have been violated.

We will work to improve employment equity in the public sector, focusing on better opportunities for women, aboriginal people, visible minorities and the disabled.

#### **Building Our Children's Future**

This Government's vision for the future extends well beyond its term of office. The agenda includes new measures for ensuring a healthy and secure future for our children.

Schools and communities will be encouraged to participate fully in the development and implementation of the Year 2000 initiative, to ensure that all young people in British Columbia achieve personal excellence and are equipped to meet the challenges of the next century.

We have already made changes to education funding for the 1992/93 school year. These improvements include funding adjustments for inflation and increased enrolment, and additional funding for new computers and for school districts experiencing rapid growth.

We have also provided ongoing funding for the continuation of school meal programs to ensure a healthy learning environment for our children. These programs will be carried out in consultation with parents, school staff, and local communities.

This Government will take action to reduce financial barriers to post-secondary education while reviewing other access questions and reporting back to this Assembly on ways to improve student financial assistance.

This Session will see the sod-turning for the beginning of construction of the University of Northern British Columbia. We will also recognize the achievement of two full years of academic study, and improve program transferability, by introducing legislation that allows universities and colleges to award Associate Degrees in either Arts or Sciences.

This Government will also use every opportunity to encourage educational programs and community initiatives which promote better health, and health awareness, among people of all ages.

A pilot AIDS education research program, introduced in November, is testing the effectiveness of advanced learning technology in helping young people deal maturely with this disease and the associated risks.

Fifty-five communities across the province are undertaking local preventive health projects with the assistance of the Healthy Community Initiative Fund, and the British Columbia Health Research Foundation is supporting community health promotion projects for women and children.

The findings of the Royal Commission on Health Care and Costs represent an opportunity for all British Columbians to focus on health care reforms to preserve and enhance what we enjoy today. This Government will prepare its response to the Commission's report by fall 1992, after ensuring that the public have every opportunity to make their views heard.

It will not only be incumbent upon this Government, but on British Columbia's health care professions and institutions to show greater accountability and more efficient management in the delivery of health care services.

We will introduce a new *Medical and Health Care Services Act* to improve management of the health care system. This legislation will place particular emphasis on access to care, spending smarter, and greater flexibility in options for laboratory services.

This Government will invest our health care dollars more wisely, to minimize the long-term social and economic costs of health problems. We will therefore place increased emphasis on preventive programs, and devote more resources to community care, mental health services, home care and immunization.

This Government will save taxpayer dollars, while increasing air ambulance capacity, by rationalizing the operations of Government Air Services. The fleet will be downsized, and a third full-time aircraft assigned to the life-saving task of emergency evacuation. Better management and cross-Government coordination will enhance the Service's emergency response capability and gain value for money through improved aircraft utilization.

Long surgery and treatment waiting lists are unacceptable. We will undertake an independent audit of waiting lists to investigate the causes of delays and recommend action to reduce waiting times.

We will also respond to overcrowding in emergency wards through a special management review team, to assist hospitals in delivering the best possible level of patient care within their budgets.

In this session, we will introduce legislation to provide better protection for public health by increasing the inspection powers of health officials, establishing in law a Health Surveillance Registry, and allowing the delegation of inspection and other powers to municipalities.

Consistent with the Seaton report, new legislative amendments will make tobacco products less accessible and less attractive to children and youth.

Our children's future and our economic well-being depend on a healthy and sustainable environment. That is the central message of the *Globe* '92 environmental conference and trade fair being hosted by British Columbia in Vancouver this week. We will vigorously pursue additional efforts to ensure British Columbia continues to host this important series of international biennial events, and to advance our province's leadership in the development of environmental technologies.

Children in schools across the province are learning to be responsible stewards of the environment through the Eco Education Program, launched in November. This program will operate in the context of a comprehensive environmental education strategy being developed by the ministries of Education and Environment, Lands and Parks.

A process of public consultation toward the complete reform and renewal of the Province's environmental legislation will be carried out over the coming months, leading to the introduction, in future sittings of the House, of new legislation for wildlife, fisheries and their habitat; water management; and environmental protection. During this session, a new *Environmental Assessment Act* will be introduced, to ensure that decisions on resource development projects are reviewed under provincial law.

This Government has already demonstrated its commitment to the control of industrial pollution, by introducing the toughest regulation in Canada for discharges of chlorinated compounds from pulp mills. In this session we will introduce legislation to strengthen the standards for regulation and clean-up of contaminated sites, through application of the polluter-pay principle.

We will amend the *Waste Management Act* to encourage waste reduction, re-use and recycling. We will use procurement policies to stimulate markets for recycled products. We will also introduce measures to strengthen the ability of the Greater Vancouver Regional District to administer and enforce its delegated responsibilities for air management in the Lower Mainland.

Steps will be taken toward rescinding the privatization of environmental laboratory services which provide quality control for monitored data from waste discharge sources.

We will continue to support environmental industries and improved waste management by introducing a comprehensive beverage container strategy, by encouraging municipal waste reduction and recycling programs, and by promoting private recycling initiatives for tires, batteries, used oils and plastics.

Public consultation on a comprehensive clean air strategy for British Columbia will begin with the release of a discussion paper which addresses regional, national and global issues in this area.

This Government has established a new Commission on Resources and Environment to help move beyond valley-by-valley conflicts throughout British Columbia. We are taking a new approach to land use planning and decision making, a new direction aimed at protecting our environmental heritage and bringing stability to communities that depend on our forests.

The integrity and openness brought to this process by the Commissioner will help us better develop a comprehensive land use strategy for our province. To establish the best possible climate for the new Commission to begin its work, this Government has taken difficult decisions in a number of areas of the province. Timber harvesting will be shifted in some areas, in order to retain land use options while also maintaining forest jobs.

Our forests continue to be crucial to the jobs and livelihood of people throughout our Province. This Government recognizes British Columbia must do a better job than it has in the past to ensure that forestry practices are economically and ecologically sustainable, and that we receive the fullest possible value from the use of this resource.

Recent reductions in allowable cuts, public consultation on a new forests practices code and old growth forests, and last month's forest industry trade mission to develop markets in the Pacific Rim, will promote better stewardship and obtain greater benefits for this generation and those that come after us.

Legislation will be introduced in this Session to reduce the risk of revenue loss by improving controls over the marking, scaling, and movement of logs. Other amendments to the *Forests Act* will strengthen the enforcement of reforestation obligations, and ensure more consistent and fair determination of allowable cuts and administration of major tenures. The efficiency of the Small Business Forest Enterprise Program will be improved.

This Government will work with other Canadian provinces to reverse the recent United States decision to impose a countervailing duty on B.C. softwood lumber exports to the U.S. This interim tariff threatens our wood processing industries and the livelihood of the people who work in them. This American tariff is unfair and cannot be justified.

The people of British Columbia will be asked for their views on our Province's energy future. A British Columbia Energy Council will be established to advise Government on the development of a comprehensive, long-term energy plan for the province. One of the first tasks of the Council will be to examine the issue of power exports.

Our children's future depends on the wise stewardship of all the resources they will inherit. The moratorium on bulk exports of our Province's fresh water was extended in December to allow sufficient time for public input on proposed policies. Action has also been taken to renew our commitment to preserving British Columbia's farmland. While recognizing the economic and recreational importance of golf courses to residents and visitors to our Province, we must maintain an adequate level of fertile land to produce food for present and future generations.

#### Madame Speaker and Honourable Members:

This Government now seeks the help of all British Columbians and the Members of this Assembly to carry out these priorities of a fair, open and balanced Government, a strengthened economy and social safety net for the people of our Province, and a healthy and secure future for our children.

I leave you now to the business of this Session, with full confidence that you will favourably discharge your duties and responsibilities.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor was then pleased to retire.

The Speaker delivered her reserved decision as follows:

Honourable Members:

On Thursday last, the House Leader of the Official Opposition rose on a matter of privilege relating to an alleged failure of the Minister of Finance to fulfil a commitment made to the House, which the Honourable Member argues constitutes a breach of privilege and a contempt of the House.

The Member has complied with the technical requirements on the raising of a matter of privilege and in addition has complied with Practice Recommendation #7, by giving to the Chair notice of his intention to raise the matter of privilege prior to the commencement of the sitting.

The Chair has examined with considerable care, the Member's statement and the material referred to therein. As the Chair understands it, the Member alleges that the Minister of Finance undertook to table in the Assembly certain reports, background working papers and resumes of the persons involved in what is known as the Peat Marwick Report of the Province's finances. The Member places considerable emphasis on the Official Opposition's request for the papers in question to be tabled prior to the delivery of the Minister of Finance's Budget Speech.

The requests in question were made by the Official Opposition on March 18 and 19, 1992. Four sitting days lapsed between the last request and the day upon which the matter of privilege was raised. The Chair also observes that on the day following the raising of the matter of privilege, the Honourable Minister of Finance tabled with the House the Peat Marwick Report, the *curricula vitae* of the accountants who worked on the Report and a table showing a ranking and analysis of Canada's leading public accounting firms.

I have examined the *Hansard* references referred to in the statement filed by House Leader of the Official Opposition. On March 18, 1992, the Member for Surrey-White Rock requested the tabling of the resumes of all of those involved in the preparation of the Peat Marwick Report prior to the delivery of the Budget on March 26, 1992. The same Member then asked, in a supplementary question, that the entire financial report of Peat Marwick be tabled, together with the method of accounting used, the terms of reference from the original commissioning of the report, and any expression of interest from other accounting firms. To these requests, the Minister of Finance indicated his willingness to table all of Peat Marwick's reports which he described as being in "the public domain."

I now turn to the questions and answers referred to in the *Hansard* report of March 19, 1992, at page 38. Again, the Member for Surrey-White Rock requested the tabling of the resumes of the accountants who worked on the Peat Marwick Report and made a specific request in relation to one of the accountants. The Minister responded that he would attempt to obtain from Peat Marwick the list of the requested resumes. Finally, the Honourable Member referred in a general way to the *Hansard* report for Wednesday, March 25, 1992, when a further reference was made of the Minister of Finance to table all documents related to the Peat Marwick Report, in addition to the resumes of the project's accountants. On this day, the Honourable Minister said that he made a commitment to table in the House the reports from Peat Marwick and further undertook to table the *curricula vitae* of all the accountants who worked on the project as soon as they were received. As I have earlier noted, both the resumes and the reports were in fact tabled by the Minister on Friday, March 27, 1992, the day after the matter of privilege was raised by the Honourable House Leader of the Opposition.

The Member has not been able to identify, nor have I been able to find in the *Hansard* report any undertaking given by the Minister of Finance to table the documents specified, prior to the delivery of his Budget Speech.

The Budget Speech commenced, in terms of Opposition participation, simultaneously with the tabling of the documents presented in accordance with the undertaking of the Minister. Accordingly, the Chair cannot find the Member's ability to perform Legislative duties has been interfered with so as to give rise to a *prima facie* case of privilege.

I again thank the Honourable Member for his courtesy in complying with Practice Recommendation #7.

"In Her Majesty's name, His Honour the Lieutenant Governor doth thank Her Majesty's loyal subjects, accepts their benevolence, and doth assent to this Bill."

The Speaker delivered her reserved decision as follows:

Honourable Members:

On Tuesday last the Honourable Leader of the Third Party rose on a matter of privilege, appropriate notice of which was given, and tendered a motion, in accordance with the practice of this Assembly. Representations on the matter were made to the Chair by the Honourable Government House Leader and the Honourable Member for Fort Langley-Aldergrove.

The essence of the Honourable Leader's complaint is that the Honourable the Premier had deliberately misled the House. If established, that offence constitutes a grave contempt of Parliament. (Sir Erskine May's *Parliamentary Practice*, 17th Edition, pp. 110 and 225.)

In support of his submission, the Honourable Leader of the Third Party relies upon the following facts:

- 1. That a "fair wage" policy was announced in the Speech from the Throne on March 17th last.
- 2. That on March 17th last, two questions were directed to the Honourable the Premier; first, "What's a fair wage policy, Premier? What's your definition?" Answer: "Well, that is legislation to be brought forward by the Minister of Labour in this session of the Legislature", and second, "But there's a general perception it's unfair or you wouldn't use these terms such as fair wage is that correct?" Answer: "Well, I don't want to belabour this because I don't want to get into future legislation that right now is being formulated, after substantial consultation, but yes we want to be fair employers. What that means we are going to put before the Legislature in the near future." These questions and answers are taken from a transcript of a news conference on March 17th.
  - 3. That on March 26th, the Honourable the Premier during Oral Questions was asked:

"Can the Premier tell us now, yes or no, whether he will bring the fair wage policy to this House in the form of legislation prior to its implementation?"

to which the response was:

"I will give the same answer I gave the last time. The answer is yes."

With respect to this question and answer, the Honourable Government House Leader submitted that the question sought clarification on the issue of legislation, while the answer was directed to the issue of debate.

The Honourable Government House Leader further submitted that the true essence of the entire exchange of questions and answers was whether or not there would be a *debate* on the policy — rather than on the *method* by which the issue would be debated. In support, the Honourable Government House Leader quotes the Honourable the Premier, on March 18th, as saying, "I can assure the House that there is going to be a lot of time for debate in this sitting of the Legislature, and I'm sure the Honourable Member, with his interest in seeing that working people in this province are treated fairly, will be debating that issue during this sitting of the Legislature."

The Honourable Government House Leader also quotes the Honourable Minister of Labour, on March 23rd, on the same subject (p. 88 of *Hansard*), as saying, "If the member is anxious for a debate, he can raise it during members' statements. Otherwise, this Government will have a debate in this House about fair wages; that's our commitment."

The Chair has carefully considered the statements to which reference has been made, the submissions made by Honourable Members and the law of Parliament relevant to the issues. In applying that law, the Chair must always apply the same rules — whether the subject matter at issue be a highly contentious one, or a matter on which the degree of contention may be minimal.

An examination of the authorities on matters of privilege and contempt indicate that contempt is usually founded upon an admission by a Member of deliberately intending to mislead the House (Profumo case, U.K. House of Commons debates, 1963, p. 246), or, the protracted giving of false evidence before a Committee of the House. Statements of intention of future action are traditionally set forth in the Speech from the Throne and are also frequently made both in the House and outside the House. It seems to the Chair that the functioning of the House would be very seriously impeded if such statements, which may not be implemented, were taken as constituting the foundation of an allegation of the grave offence of contempt.

The Chair notes that on page 4 of his submission, the Honourable Leader of the Third Party says, and I quote, "A common theme among the answers given was cautious assurance that the policy in question would be brought before this Assembly for full debate."

The Honourable Leader of the Third Party may feel aggrieved by any references to the bringing forward of legislation. However, for the Chair to find, *prima facie*, that thereby a grave contempt of the House has been committed, would not be in accordance with the law of Parliament, to which the Chair has made reference and, accordingly, the matter must fail.

#### Honourable Members:

Earlier today the Leader of the Official Opposition sought to move adjournment of the House, pursuant to Standing Order 35, to discuss a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, emergency health care priorities, especially surgical wait-lists in the Province.

Following submissions from both sides of the House, I reserved my opinion as to whether the matter qualified under Standing Order 35, in line with the usual custom.

I would note at the outset that the topic raised by the Member is apparently of fairly broad scope and the kind of matter that is customarily discussed in the Committee of the Whole during Estimates. Members will note that over the past few days, the House has been embarked upon a debate customarily referred to as the "Budget Debate" which was concluded by passage of the resolution "'That the Speaker do now leave the Chair' for the House to go into Committee of Supply." That resolution passed last night, immediately prior to the adjournment hour. Accordingly, it is competent for the House to embark upon consideration of the Estimates of the Ministry of Health in Committee of Supply and thus an ordinary parliamentary opportunity will occur when the matter may be discussed.

Secondly, I note that the statement raises a matter which has been mentioned on numerous occasions in this House, both during this Session and during previous Sessions and accordingly is a matter of long standing.

May's *Parliamentary Practice*, 16th edition, at page 370, points out that "The fact that a grievance is continuing is not, in itself, sufficient if it is not of recent occurrence."

For a parallel to this matter, I would refer Members to the *Journals* of the House, 1981, at page 124, when a similar matter was raised and essentially similar reasons given why it did not qualify under the provisions of Standing Order 35, and accordingly ought not to proceed.

The Speaker delivered her reserved opinion as follows:

### Honourable Members:

In relation to an application by the Honourable Minister of Forests for an adjournment of the House under Standing Order 35, I make the following observations:

The Minister has asked that this House set aside its normal business to discuss what he describes as a grave environmental and economic threat to our Province arising by virtue of the introduction of the Asian gypsy moth to British Columbia. He states that the Government has made a commitment to give the public ample notice of spraying and further states that yesterday the Cabinet declared an environmental emergency and accelerated the programme of aerial spraying of a pesticide over specified areas of the Province.

It would appear that under the original permit, the Federal Department of Agriculture had the right to commence application of the pesticide on April 26, 1992, but we were advised yesterday, that based on technical advice received, this programme needs to be commenced as early as April 15, 1992.

The Minister further advises this House that the undertaking to give the public ample notice militates in favour of the subject matter being debated in this House on an urgent basis.

The Honourable House Leader of the Official Opposition raises two objections as to why this matter does not qualify under the provisions of Standing Order 35:

- 1. The fact that the Cabinet made a decision yesterday declaring an environmental emergency does not constitute the matter as urgent and pressing.
- 2. The fact that a Private Member's Statement on Asian gypsy moth appears on the Orders of the Day for discussion on Friday, offends the anticipation rule in Standing Order 35.

With respect to the second objection, I am satisfied, on a close examination of Standing Order 35 (10) (d) that a Private Member's Statement does not qualify as "a matter which has been previously appointed for consideration by the House" or as "a Notice of Motion which has been previously given and not withdrawn."

Dealing with the first objection, the Honourable House Leader of the Official Opposition argues that as the subject matter has been raised in Oral Question Period and has been the subject of a Ministerial Statement, no emergency of an urgent nature exists and that "It's not really a crisis at all." The Minister presenting the application argues that the necessity to commence the spraying process within seven days of the Standing Order 35 Application, combined with a declaration of an environmental emergency, has changed the nature of the matter to an urgent one. In addition, he further urges that the undertaking to give this matter the widest possible publicity, brings the issue clearly within the parameters of Standing Order 35 as a definite matter of urgent public importance deserving of debate in this House.

I wish to digress here and make some general observations which I hope will be of assistance to the House. One of the reasons the Chair was unable to render its decision on Wednesday when this matter was first raised, was the particular difficulty posed by this application. An examination of the history of applications under Standing Order 35 demonstrates that few qualified under the stringent rules applicable. The Chair notes that in 1985, Standing Order 35 was substantially amended and subsection (6) now provides that a qualifying matter may not only be debated on the day on which the matter is raised, but may be set down for hearing the following day. The clear wording of this Standing Order assists the Chair in relation to the giving of its opinion to the House today as opposed to yesterday.

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The Chair also observes that in borderline cases, presiding officers have historically rendered a decision which will permit further consideration of the matter by the House.

While the Chair has some doubts in this matter, and acknowledges the technical objections raised by the House Leader of the Official Opposition, the Chair is persuaded, in these somewhat unique circumstances, that the matter raised by the Minister is in order, and is of urgent public importance. Accordingly I shall, with the general consent of the House, waive reading the statement aloud, but I shall ask, under Standing Order 35 (4), whether the Member has leave to move the Motion. Honourable Members will understand that if objection is taken to the Minister moving the Motion, the final decision as to whether or not this requested debate will proceed will be decided by this House.

The Speaker delivered her reserved decision as follows:

Honourable Members:

On Friday last, the Member for Fort Langley-Aldergrove sought to raise a matter of privilege in the Legislative Assembly. The essence of his allegation was that the Attorney General had seen, and admitted having seen, a copy of a Draft Report of the Constitution Committee prior to presentation in the House of the Final Report. The Member quoted the following comments of the Attorney General:

"Some members may know that I was the deputy chair of the constitution committee in a previous parliament, and as a result of the preliminary work we did last year, I sure have a sense of how difficult the task was for members of that committee. I read the report yesterday. I thought it was an absolutely outstanding report."

It is important in this case to take note of the facts which may be gathered from the *Journals* and records of the House. Firstly, this House appointed a Committee, during the previous Session prior to the election, which was called the Select Standing Committee on Constitutional Matters and InterGovernmental Relations, of which the Attorney General was the Deputy Chair. That Committee held numerous hearings and meetings during the period prior to the election and, in fact, tabled a Preliminary Report with the Clerk of the House on August 15, 1991, after the House had adjourned. That Report urged that the Committee's work be continued.

Secondly, after the election, by consent of all parties, a Members' Committee on the Constitution was formed and held a variety of hearings prior to the commencement of this Session and tabled an Interim Report with the Clerk of the House on February 18, 1992.

Thirdly, the Special Committee on Constitutional Matters, appointed on Opening Day, then proceeded to hold numerous hearings and tabled a Final Report on April 2. It is important to note that the Final Report incorporated the results of hearings held over the past year and the Chair can see no reason why the Attorney General, who was in part responsible for its content, should not in fact have received a draft of the Report.

The greater issue raised by the alleged breach of privilege, however, relates to access to Draft Reports of Committees. It has been the practice in this House that Members of the House may see material presented to Committees and may also see Draft Reports prior to their presentation in the House. The restraint on the Member is that the Member not publish or repeat the contents of such material before the Committee has actually reported to the House.

Parliament has exercised its right to bar preliminary publication of Reports on the grounds that such preliminary publication would tend to impair the work of the Committee. It is important to note the distinction between the bar on preliminary publication to the public and the receipt by a Member of the House of a copy of a Report prior to its presentation in the House.

Erskine May's *Parliamentary Practice* (20th Edition) at pages 153 and 154, indicates that with respect to publication of evidence, the rule was not usually enforced where the evidence had been presented at public meetings. However, the publication or disclosure of proceedings of committees closed to the public, or of Draft Reports of committees before they have been reported to the House, will constitute a breach of privilege or a contempt.

The Chair observes that the Attorney General's comments were made some two hours after the Report was presented in the House.

For these reasons, I must accordingly find that there is no breach of privilege.

On Thursday last, the Government House Leader and both Opposition House Leaders, rose on a point of order relating to the conduct of Question Period in this House.

The heart of the guidelines for Question Period is embodied in the words of Standing Order 47A (b) which read as follows:

questions and answers shall be brief and precise, and stated without argument or opinion.

While the Chair has, from time to time, recited this particular subsection, and believes all Honourable Members are quite familiar with its intent, based on the comments of last Thursday's point of order, quite clearly, neither Government nor Opposition is completely satisfied with the way Question Period is unfolding.

The Chair has also examined the official record of this House covering the last two weeks of Question Period, and while many questions and answers conform to the rule, many do not. Unless the Members, in framing questions and preambles, and Ministers, in formulating their answers, conscientiously observe the spirit of section 47A, the House is in difficulty. The Chair is powerless to rewrite questions or rephrase answers for Honourable Members. Presiding officers throughout the Commonwealth have stated that Members must take the ultimate responsibility for conforming to the rules which are the Members' rules and not the Speaker's rules.

To assist Members in better understanding the areas which appear to be giving the House the most difficulty, I have asked the Sergeant-at-Arms to circulate a Decision of a former Speaker of this House, which may be found on page 86 of *Parliamentary Practice in British Columbia*. The Speaker's comments of June 30, 1982, deal very specifically with the same complaints voiced by all Honourable House Leaders on Thursday last.

I am also supplying to each Member of the House the rules as stated in Beauchesne's *Parliamentary Rules and Forms*, which Honourable Members may wish to keep readily available, to assist in framing questions and formulating answers during Question Period.

The Chair in this Legislature is prepared to guide and assist but ultimately it is up to all Honourable Members to take responsibility for making Question Period in this House effective and in accordance with the well established rules.

Yesterday, the Honourable Member for Richmond East rose, pursuant to Standing Order 35, seeking leave to move adjournment of the House to discuss a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, the crisis in the delivery of health care services in our Province due to the labour dispute between hospital workers and their employers. Notice was given to the Chair under Practice Recommendation #8, for which the Chair thanks the Honourable Member.

The matter raised is akin to, but not necessarily identical with, an application on April 8th last by the Honourable Leader of the Official Opposition under the provisions of Standing Order 35.

The Honourable Member stated a number of circumstances, as follows:

- 1. that the dispute in question has lasted 15 days,
- 2. that the dispute has now reached a critical stage,
- 3. that the number of cancellations of scheduled surgery has increased,
- 4. that there exists the threat of a province-wide strike.

The Honourable Member made further observations which, with respect, would be matters of debate if the House was embarked upon a motion to adjourn.

A review of the numerous decisions of earlier Speakers of this House, and decisions in other jurisdictions, clearly shows that matters raised pursuant to Standing Order 35, in order to qualify, must

- 1. involve more than the ordinary administration of the law in this instance, more than the law relating to labour disputes (Sir Erskine May's *Parliamentary Practice*, 16th edition, p. 372),
- 2. involve more than an on-going issue, even though new facts may have just emerged relating to that issue (Sir Erskine May's *Parliamentary Practice*, 16th edition, p. 370, Speaker *Schroeder, Journals*, 1978, p. 127 and *Journals*, 1982, p. 60).

The dispute in question, as the Honourable Member herself observed, has been on-going for some time.

Moreover, the House was advised yesterday by the Honourable the Attorney General that the Industrial Relations Council is dealing with the issue and that the Minister of Labour was to meet with the parties today.

Accordingly, the Chair concludes that the subject matter, while serious, involves the ordinary administration of the law and, in accordance with the authorities above cited, the Chair is precluded from asking leave of the House for the Honourable Member to proceed.

Honourable Members:

On Wednesday last, during Oral Question Period, a point of order was raised by the Honourable the Attorney General relating to a question posed by the Honourable Member for Okanagan West. I quote the text of the question because of the important implications which flow from the point of order raised:

"My question today is to the Minister of Labour with respect to the Firestone case. If the Minister's personal legal costs were deemed to be an appropriate public expense of his previous role as Opposition Critic, and even though some of these funds were expended after he became a Minister, perhaps the Minister can explain why the settlement costs were not also paid from public funds."

The Honourable Attorney General suggests that such a question directed to the Minister of Labour is out of order in that it deals with matters outside the Minister's responsibility, and also that the question deals with an issue that was current in the previous Parliament.

The Honourable Leader of the Third Party, speaking to the point of order, referred to the practice of this House in directing questions to Ministers and the Honourable Member for Okanagan West stated in his submissions that although the issue first arose in a previous Parliament, the information requested related to funds expended after November the 5th by the current administration. The Honourable Member for Okanagan West also advised the House that he had written letters to the Auditor General and the Deputy Attorney General on this matter.

The guidelines relating to questions and answers are outlined in some detail, as Members are aware, in the material which was circulated to every Member of this House on April 13th, 1992. Once again, I urge all Honourable Members to examine that material.

The overriding principle relating to questions is stated in Beauchesne, 5th edition, at page 132: "A brief question, seeking information about an important matter of some urgency, which falls within the administrative responsibility of the Government or of a specific minister to whom it is addressed, is in order." When that guideline is applied to the question posed by the Honourable Member for Okanagan West, it seems to the Chair that the subject matter of the question, does not fall within the administrative responsibility of the Minister; to the contrary, the question appears to ask the Minister for a policy explanation as to why settlement costs were not paid from public funds when personal legal costs were described as "an appropriate public expense."

A further examination of the question as reported in *Hansard* could well lead to the conclusion that the Member is seeking an opinion from the Minister, rather than information, and accordingly would fall squarely in the prohibition quoted in Beauchesne, 5th edition, page 132, sub-paragraph (3). The Chair, however, does not rely as much on this ground, in assessing the propriety of the question, as it does on the administrative responsibility aspect previously mentioned.

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Any question, when challenged on a point of order, must be examined on its individual merit. The Chair has examined and considered the past practices of this House as it relates to the conduct of Oral Question Period. While there may be a perception that certain practices were permitted in the past, I am unable to find instances in the *Journals* of this House when a similar question was, on a point of order being raised, found to be within a particular Minister's administrative responsibility, and I cannot find any Parliamentary authority which would suggest that the question, as framed by the Honourable Member for Okanagan West, and directed to the Minister of Labour, is an admissible question.

In addition to the authorities previously cited, procedural authorities in both the House of Commons in this country and the United Kingdom have been consulted and I would advise all Honourable Members that the Chair's opinion in this matter is confirmed in both Parliaments.

There may be other approaches available to the Honourable Member to pursue the information he seeks.

For the reasons stated, therefore, the Chair rules the question, as worded, and directed to the Minister of Labour, out of order.

In his statement, the Honourable Member refers to widespread unemployment and the seriousness of the Province's financial situation.

In this Province, as in others which share a similar standing order, Speakers have time and time again stated that on Standing Order 35 applications the Chair must focus on the <u>urgency of debate</u>, as opposed to the <u>urgency of the matter</u>, and in this regard I refer Honourable Members to the British Columbia *Journals*, 1961, p. 97; 1990, p. 136 and to *Parliamentary Practice in British Columbia*, p. 46.

Another criteria applied to Standing Order 35 applications requires that the matter complained of must be of recent occurrence and raised without delay. In this regard, I quote from Sir Erskine May's *Parliamentary Practice*, 16th edition, p. 370: "The fact that new information has been received regarding a matter that has been continuing for some time, does not in itself make the matter one of urgency." It seems to the Chair that the provincial deficit has been a continuing matter for some time as opposed to a matter that has suddenly arisen which would require the setting aside of normal House business.

Finally, the authorities clearly state that the matter involved must be raised at the earliest opportunity or it will fail in urgency. The Chair notes that the specific matter was raised during Question Period in this House yesterday, and accordingly, the matter could have been raised at an earlier opportunity. I refer Honourable Members to a similar case reported in the *Journals* of this House of July 26, 1990, p. 136.

The Chair has no difficulty acknowledging the matter raised by the Honourable Member is one of great consequence, but it fails, for the above reasons, to qualify under the provisions of Standing Order 35.

An examination of the *Journals* of this House will reveal many Speakers' opinions which set forth the essential criteria consistently applied to Standing Order 35 applications. The criteria adopted in this House, as well as in other provincial legislatures, are taken from the practice at Westminster set forth in May's *Parliamentary Practice*, 16th edition, pp. 368-374.

Among the special restrictions which the Chair must apply, is the requirement that the matter must be of recent occurrence and raised without delay (May, p. 370). Honourable Members will be aware that take-over issues relating to Canadian Airlines have been ongoing for some weeks. In fact the question of a Government loan guarantee was earlier raised in this House on October 21, 1992. (Oral Question Period, *Hansard*, p. 3513).

It may be urged that the material from the Council of Canadian Airlines Employees tabled by the Honourable Member for Prince George-Omineca, ought to convert the matter from its ongoing status, to one of recent occurrence. However, as stated in the authority cited, "the fact that new information has been received regarding a matter that has been continuing for some time does not, in itself, make the matter one of urgency."

The issue raised by the Honourable Member is manifestly of great importance, but nevertheless, for the reasons stated, the matter fails to qualify under Standing Order 35.
