## Wednesday, March 15, 2000

Prayers by Mrs. Eva George.

This being the first day of the fourth meeting of the Thirty-sixth Parliament of the Province of British Columbia for the dispatch of business, pursuant to a Proclamation of the Honourable Garde B. Gardom, Q.C., Lieutenant Governor of the Province, dated the 2nd day of March, 2000.

The Honourable GARDE B. GARDOM, Q.C., Lieutenant Governor of the Province, having entered the House, took his seat on the Throne, and was pleased to deliver the following gracious Speech:

Mr. Speaker, Honourable Members of the Legislature

It's my pleasure to welcome you today to the opening of the Fourth Session of the Thirty-Sixth Parliament of British Columbia . . . and the first session of the 21st century.

All members extend their heartiest congratulations to the Right Honourable Adrienne Clarkson on her appointment as Governor General of Canada and their sincere thanks to the Right Honourable Romeo Leblanc for his service to our country as the Queen's representative.

British Columbians have every reason to face this new century with confidence and optimism.

But we face it without some of our brightest lights.

We note with sadness the passing those who have made public service a noble calling:

Wesley Black, who served in cabinet for 20 years;

Fred Gingell, who left his mark on this place with his unshakeable faith in the role of the legislator;

Don Munro, who served Esquimalt-Saanich as a Member of Parliament — and served this country as an ambassador in Central America;

Leo Nimsick, who represented the Kootenays in this Legislature for more than a quarter-century;

Lorne Shantz, who served this Legislature as its Speaker for five years;

And John Tisdalle, who was the MLA for Saanich and the Islands for nearly two decades.

We are saddened as well by the loss last week of Chief Joe Mathias of the Squamish First Nation.

Chief Mathias was one of those rarest of individuals: someone who had insight into the past and a strong vision of the future. He understood his people's profound connection to this land, their culture and their ancestors. He understood the injustices of the past, and their long reach into the present.

But he could also see the day when those injustices will be righted. And he worked tirelessly for that day — helping to shape the BC Treaty Commission, helping to found the First Nations Summit, and leading the Squamish First Nation.

As we remember him today, let us rededicate ourselves to that day when justice is finally done—the most truly fitting memorial for a great leader, and a great British Columbian.

We have lost other community leaders as well: former Musqueam Chief Edward Sparrow; Gerry Stoney, the former president of IWA Canada; entrepreneurs Clark Bentall and Tong Louie; Norman Richards, the first president of the BC Government Employees Union; health reform activist Sharon Martin; newspaper publisher Tara Singh Hayer, a member of the Order of Canada and the Order of British Columbia; and Major-General Bertram Hoffmeister commander of the Seaforth Highlanders.

We marked the passing of well-known British Columbians like Beachcombers icon Robert Clothier; music producer Bruce Fairburn; mountain climber and author Jim Haverl; racing car driver Greg Moore; author and social activist Bridget Moran; the acclaimed contemporary artist Jack Shadbolt; and internationally respected composer Jean Coulthard.

And one year ago this month, we said farewell to Jack Webster — a tough, but fair-minded scourge of many who have occupied these seats and a great believer in the wisdom of the ordinary person.

The past year and a half have seen many changes in British Columbia. Changes in political leadership, and changes in the political landscape.

Now it is time for changes in the way we conduct politics in this province.

#### New budget transparency law

My government recognises the fundamental importance of transparency in budgeting.

It is critical that British Columbians have the highest confidence in the budget numbers. Citizens may argue about the choices made in the budget. But they must have confidence that these choices, and the facts and assumptions behind them, are fully and fairly presented.

My government has accepted a broad range of advice on the budget-making process. The Auditor General, the Enns Panel, the Official Opposition and individual British Columbians have been heard—and heeded.

In this session, my government will introduce a new law: the *Budget Transparency and Accountability Act*.

The aim of this act is to give British Columbians the facts, all the facts, and nothing but the facts.

The new law will make important changes to the budget-making process.

The process of building the annual budget will start with an all-party committee of the Legislature. This committee will be provided with up-to-date information from the Finance Minister on the province's economic and fiscal performance. It will then consult with British Columbians on the provincial budget, and make a public report on its consultations by December 31st of each year.

The new law will set a fixed budget deadline. This will ensure that the budget debate is conducted earlier and is completed prior to March 31st each year.

The new law will require complete disclosure of all budget assumptions and forecasts, including the advice of the Economic Forecast Council. The completeness of this disclosure will be certified in writing by the Secretary of the Treasury Board.

The new law will require the government's bottom line now include the bottom lines of crown corporations and other government agencies.

The new law will open the books on all major capital projects, fully disclosing their objectives, business case, performance targets and, each and every year, the current and anticipated costs to the taxpayer.

The new law will hold the government to a higher standard of transparency if it uses Special Warrants. However, my government will follow the direction of the Enns panel, and make

Supplementary Estimates the rule, not the exception. Supplementary Estimates will be tabled in the Legislature for open debate.

These changes will assure citizens they can be confident about the completeness and transparency of the budget in British Columbia.

But we must go further. When you receive this new law for your consideration, it will not be complete. And for good reason.

My government will keep one section of the *Budget Transparency and Accountability Act* open: the section dealing with the estimates process in the Legislature.

The expertise and determination to make that process work lie with this Assembly.

So to you, Members of the Legislature, goes the task of creating this section of the new law, which will ensure the estimates are scrutinized as thoroughly, effectively and efficiently as possible.

As you do that, I encourage you to draw on the guidance offered to us by the Enns Panel and by Fred Gingell, the late member for Delta South.

#### New culture of openness, co-operation and balance

Just as we must restore confidence in the budget process, we must also restore confidence in this Assembly.

There is a balance we must strike between the need for honest, forceful debate . . . and the need for a new culture of civility, openness, respect and co-operation.

My government will work with the Official Opposition to reach agreement on a parliamentary calendar that will end legislation by attrition, establish workable timelines, and ensure a proper balance between Member responsibilities in this Assembly and in their constituencies.

As the Premier has said: "no one of us knows as much as all of us." My government will seek the assistance of committees of the Legislature to focus on important emerging public issues that transcend partisan boundaries.

Change must come, not only in the rules of this House, but in its culture.

Civility and respect are gained by understanding a fundamental truth in our parliamentary democracy: that Members of this House are rivals, not enemies.

My government will not claim a monopoly on wisdom. But it will seek to achieve critical balances in the budget and in its agenda.

My government will seek to balance the need to maintain vital public services, with the need to cut taxes to fuel economic growth, and the need to control the deficit.

My government's agenda will also seek to achieve critical social balances: a balance between economic progress and environmental safeguards, and a balance in land claims negotiations between sharing economic gains now through interim measures, and negotiating treaties that can be sustained forever.

Moving in an extreme way in any one of these areas would undermine steady, stable progress in our province.

#### Strengthening and modernizing health care

Finding these balances requires choices. And those choices begin with our universal health care system — the bedrock of family life in Canada and BC.

Health care is the top priority of today's families.

In the coming weeks, my government will set out an agenda to begin to relieve the pressure on our hospitals — the heart of our health care system.

We must address the shortage of nurses today, and expand training for the nurses we'll need tomorrow.

We must reach a new agreement with BC's doctors.

We must further upgrade hospital equipment.

We must improve access to long-term care and home support — to provide better care outside of hospitals.

Money alone will not sustain our public health care system.

We also need innovation. That means providing British Columbians with the right care — at the right time — in the right place.

For example, last fall, Saskatoon offered free flu immunization for seniors and those at risk, well in advance of the winter.

The result was no overcrowding in hospital emergency rooms during the flu season.

My government will bring health care providers, administrators, and other experts — from BC and from outside the province — together this spring for a *BC Health Innovation Forum*.

Our goal is to create an innovation culture throughout our health care system . . . and to broaden the leadership BC has shown in tobacco prevention to other areas.

We will roll up our sleeves and work with other provinces and the federal government to protect and improve universal health care in BC and across Canada.

My government believes that experiments now being launched elsewhere to start Canada down the road to American-style, for-profit medicine are wrong.

The cutbacks to Ottawa's support for health care have put the system under stress from coast to coast.

The federal government's contribution has fallen from 50 cents to 15 cents on every health care dollar. No province, including BC, can hold up 85 per cent of the sky and sustain universal health care over the long haul.

Universal health care is a statement of our fundamental values as a society and a province that we will stand by the sick and the infirm, and that we will work together for the health and well-being of all.

We must renew the national partnership that created Medicare.

#### **Ouality education from K to J**

Health care helps define who we are as a province. Education defines who we will be.

Every parent wants their child to have every opportunity to succeed, to get ahead, to do better.

British Columbians know that BC's economy depends on having a well-educated, well-trained workforce. Education is one of the best investments the provincial government can make.

In this session, my government will further improve the quality of education, expand the opportunities for our young people to learn, and work to keep our schools safe from violence.

We will continue to cut class sizes in BC schools. There will be fewer portables, more teachers, and more access to the tools of our modern economy.

By July, every public school in British Columbia will be connected to the Internet through the Provincial Learning Network.

My government will continue the tuition freeze in universities and colleges. We will provide new support to BC's universities and colleges to create new spaces, and offer new courses.

For many young people, a trade is the ticket to getting ahead in a rewarding career. My government will expand opportunities for apprenticeships and training.

In the new knowledge economy, learning no longer ends with graduation. Education now runs from K to J — from Kindergarten to a good job — and beyond.

Quality education will ensure British Columbians have the work skills, the professional skills, the entrepreneurial skills and the life skills to allow BC to succeed in the modern global economy.

#### Safe, affordable child care

In this session, my government will begin to build with parents and care providers a publicly-funded child care system. Our first step will be a new initiative to support safe, affordable before- and after-school care.

This will help working parents to better their skills, improve their education and earn a better living, secure in the knowledge that their children are in good hands before, during and after school.

And with the contribution those families make to our economy, we'll all be better off.

#### Tax cuts to fuel economic growth

My government will pursue a modern, balanced approach to economic growth in B.C.

My government believes that the best way to grow the economy at this time is to stimulate consumer spending by deliberately targeting tax cuts for low- and middle-income earners.

In addition, my government will introduce targetted business tax cuts to encourage job creation.

These cuts may be modest, but they will signal to all players in our economy that my government respects and values all of their contributions.

#### Consolidating our strong competitive position

BC's envied quality of life gives our work force and our entrepreneurs a strong competitive position in the global economy over the long run.

My government believes the investments we make in maintaining our public health and education systems, and in preserving our clean and healthy environment consolidate that strong position.

A healthy, educated, and productive workforce is a vital key to British Columbia's success in the modern economy. My government will continue to make these investments to secure both our environmental heritage and our long-term economic future.

In the last decade, my government set a goal to protect 12 per cent of our province's land base in parks and protected areas. During this session British Columbia will reach that goal.

My government will make this achievement permanent through a new *Parks and Protected Areas Act*. This Act will enshrine in law the protection of B.C.'s 550 parks, 141 ecological reserves and 12 special protection areas.

My government is working with the forest industry, workers, scientists, environmentalists, and others to develop new eco-certification for BC's forest products. We will fine-tune the *Forest Act* and the *Forest Practices Code of British Columbia Act* to reduce costs while promoting the sustainable use of our forests.

Our aim is to assure our lumber and pulp customers abroad that B.C.'s forest harvesting practices meet the new certification standards being demanded by our international customers. My government is confident that British Columbians have the knowledge, the experience, and the will to make this happen.

My government will also continue to encourage B.C.'s leadership in the development of new environmental technologies to compete in this \$600-billion global market. Our specific experience in this field of growing importance gives us another strategic niche in the knowledge economy.

My government will establish a *Green Economy Development Fund* to support such green enterprises. It will support research and demonstration projects for made-in-BC inventions.

My government will also examine practical ways in which our tax system can encourage businesses and individuals to shift from environmentally damaging to environmentally friendly practices.

My government will further grow our innovation economy in areas such as film and high tech. Working with the private sector, and building on the success of the BC Film Commission, my government will establish a **BC High Tech Commission** to market our high tech advantage around the world.

#### Reconnecting to the hopes and values of BC families

My government's objective in this session is

- to reconnect with the hopes and values of BC families;
- to rebuild trust between British Columbians and the new government;
- to rebuild credibility in the budget process;
- to cool down the hot politics in our province;
- to develop a new culture of openness and co-operation;
- to strengthen and modernize health care;
- to improve quality education from K to J;
- to support parents through greater access to safe, affordable child care;
- to cut taxes to fuel economic growth;
- to consolidate our competitive economic position;
- and to bring balance to government, rather than going down the narrow road of an extreme agenda.

I have every confidence in the ability of this Assembly to rise to the challenges I have placed before you.

My best wishes to all of you as you discharge your duties and responsibilities in this first legislative session of the 21st century.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor was then pleased to retire.

The Speaker reported that, in order to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy of His Honour's Speech.

On the motion of the Hon. A. Petter (Attorney General) Bill (No. 1) intituled An Act to Ensure the Supremacy of Parliament was introduced, read a first time, and Ordered to be placed on the Orders of the Day for second reading at the next sitting after today.

On the motion of the Hon. *D. Lovick*, seconded by the Hon. *J. MacPhail*, that *Tim Stevenson*, Member for Vancouver-Burrard Electoral District, be appointed Deputy Speaker for this Session of the Legislative Assembly, the House divided.

Honourable Members:

Prior to entering upon "Orders of the Day", the Leader of the Official Opposition rose pursuant to Standing Order 35 requesting leave to make a motion for adjournment of the House to discuss a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, the present school strike in British Columbia.

Firstly, I wish to thank the Honourable Member for providing my office with notice of his intention in accordance with Practice Recommendation No. 8.

The subject matter of the Honourable Leader's application is undeniably a matter of considerable importance and urgency, but successive Speakers of this House and throughout the Commonwealth have ruled that it is the <u>urgency of the debate</u> which must guide the Chair in rendering decisions under Standing Orders relating to applications for leave to adjourn the House on a matter of urgent public importance.

One of the questions the Speaker must address is whether or not there is an existing opportunity to debate the matter in question, and it seems to the Chair that the clear answer is in the affirmative. The House is presently engaged in debating the motion "That the Speaker do now leave the Chair" for the House to go into Committee of Supply — traditionally a wide-ranging debate permitting the discussion of virtually unlimited matters. Also, the matter in question has been canvassed on many occasions during Question Period and the government has outlined the present course of action being taken in relation to the matter.

What could be the result of a debate proceeding under the Honourable Leader's application? A successful application under Standing Order 35 does not result in a motion being passed, the introduction of a bill, or even a statement of opinion of the House — it simply brings on a debate. (*Parliamentary Practice in British Columbia*, 3rd edition at page 59.)

It has been ruled many times in this House that where an ordinary parliamentary opportunity exists to debate the subject matter of a Standing Order 35 application, the application for adjournment does not qualify. I refer Honourable Members to the *Journals* of this House, 1998-99, at pages 82 and 86 and 1997 *Journals*, pages 63 and 64.

I must, therefore, rule that the Honourable Member's application for leave under Standing Order 35 does not pass the rigorous restrictions applicable to such applications.

On the motion for second reading of Bill (No. 7) intituled *Public Education Support Staff Collective Bargaining Assistance Act*, a debate arose.

The debate continued.

The Speaker delivered his reserved decision as follows:

#### Honourable Members:

Today the House has been called together to consider legislation to end the support staff strike in the school system, and to permit students to return to school tomorrow, April 3, 2000. Upon introduction of Bill (No. 7) *Public Education Support Staff Collective Bargaining Assistance Act*, the Government House Leader requested that the Speaker exercise discretion pursuant to Standing Order 81 to permit the bill to advance through all three stages today. Standing Order 81 provides as follows:

"Every bill shall receive three readings on different days, prior to being passed. . . On <u>urgent or extraordinary occasions</u>, a Bill may be read twice or thrice, or advanced two or more stages in one day."

All parties in the House appeared to agree that Part 1 of the bill qualified in that it would put an end to the strike or a lockout and provide a method through arbitration to bring the issues to an end. Exception was taken by Members of the Opposition to Part 2 of the bill which created a process for addressing the bargaining structure and which they considered did not co-exist with conditions that would render the situation urgent or extraordinary.

The Government House Leader urged that the provisions were necessary to address a long-term solution to the problems identified in the special report of the Industrial Inquiry Commission appointed last week.

Having listened to the submissions of the members and considered the authorities, I stated that I was prepared to apply Standing Order 81 to allow the bill to proceed through more than one stage, but that I would provide further written reasons.

It is the practice in this House that the Speaker determines whether a bill may proceed through all stages in one day. Such rulings have been made with respect to interim Supply Acts on numerous occasions in anticipation of the imminent end of the Government's fiscal year, and with respect to emergency legislation to end labour stoppages (see Bill (No. 34) intituled *Metro Transit Collective Bargaining Assistance Act*, 1984.)

In 1996 at a special sitting of the House to deal with a labour stoppage, the Speaker found that the requirements of Standing Order 81 were not met with respect to a bill, as its form went well beyond the situation at hand, namely, in Surrey. I have compared that bill with the one at hand and note that it applied to all collective bargaining, while the bill at hand is strictly addressed to the work stoppage in the various school districts and involving clearly identified groups. The definition of employer in section 1 and the enumeration of school districts in the schedule of the bill, make its application specific.

I have considered the possibility that the bill might be severed into two bills so that Part 2 of the bill could be dealt with separately from Part 1. I have reviewed the Speaker's decision to be found at page 152-153 of the *Journals* of this House in 1995, citing the decision of Mr. Speaker Jerome of the House of Commons (Ottawa), where it was ruled that the Speaker has no authority to sever a bill.

In summary, I have considered the background circumstances and the format of the bill as a whole, and determined that Standing Order 81 should be applied to permit the bill to pass through all three stages today.

### Honourable Members:

I have had an opportunity to examine Question Period *Blues* from Monday, April 10th, and considered the line of questioning as it relates to the application of the *sub judice* rule.

Stated in its broadest terms, the rule prohibits discussion in the House of matters which are before the court for adjudication. There are obviously many refinements of this rule, and it has often been stated that the rule will be strictly enforced when it appears to the Chair that there is a real and substantial danger of prejudice to the trial of a case. It has also been stated that where there is doubt, the Speaker should rule in favour of the debate and against the *sub judice* convention with the understanding that where there is a <u>probability of prejudice</u> to any party, the convention will be applied. (*Parliamentary Practice in British Columbia*, 3rd edition, page 77.)

The *sub judice* convention does not apply, in the Chair's respectful view, to inquiries surrounding legal costs incurred by any of the parties to existing litigation, but there may well be matters involving confidentiality or solicitor and client privilege respecting such a line of questions — that is not for the Chair to decide at this time.

A much clearer example of what the Chair views as a breach of the *sub judice* rule may be found during Question Period Thursday last when the Honourable Member for Richmond-Steveston in his preamble to a supplementary question is quoted as follows:

"And now we read in the papers this morning that there's another obstruction tactic that the NDP choose to adopt here. Apparently on Monday they're going to try to convince the court that getting elected by fraudulent means is not prohibited by the *Elections Act*."

It would appear to the Chair that the Honourable Member is making direct reference to an argument to be presented to the court, and at the same time categorizing the defence as an "obstruction tactic", which the Chair finds is inappropriate and offends the letter and spirit of the *sub judice* rule.

The Chair would also observe here that it is not essential that the actual question need be put to make a determination that the *sub judice* convention has been breached. The offensive words or characterisation are often contained in the preamble to a question. I mention this in passing as there seems to be uncertainty in some Members' minds as to whether or not an offence could be committed short of asking the actual question.

I refer now to the Question Period *Blues* from Monday, April 10th. The Chair has read carefully the questions posed by the Member for Port Moody-Burnaby Mountain, and I refer in particular to the following words:

"Now, I don't know if that minister is going to be appearing for the plaintiff or for the defence this week. But I would like to know from the Premier whether he agrees with his Minister of Employment and Investment that this 1996 budget was a premeditated, determined fraud."

The question was obviously an attempt to obtain an admission of fraud in relation to the budget in question and, as such, had the potential to have a direct bearing on matters under immediate adjudication by the court's hearing in Vancouver. A similar line was pursued by the same Member in her later question where she attempts to implicate the Premier and, at the same time, requests an apology for what she describes as his role in "concocting that fraudulent budget".

The Honourable Member from Matsqui pursued a similar line of questioning, again, with the intent of soliciting some form of admission from the Premier in relation to the 1996 budget.

My examination of the pleadings filed in the Supreme Court in this case, tend to confirm the findings I have made.

It is unlikely in these cases that it can be demonstrated, with absolute certainty, that questions and answers in an exchange such as those which occurred during the last two Question Periods would, as a certainty, affect the outcome of the present court hearing. Having said that, the authorities, in the Chair's view, encourage restraint and, particularly, in an instance where the matter in question is currently being heard in the Courts of British Columbia. There is a more stringent test to be applied when the matter is actually at trial (see House of Commons *Procedure and Practice*, page 536).

In summary, the courtesies between Parliament and the courts have been well established and I would ask Honourable Members to exercise restraint in these matters in order to avoid the impression that debates in Parliament are being used to affect the outcome of matters pending before the court.

Honourable Members:

It appears that the time of the year has arrived when the Chair feels compelled to bring to the Members' attention certain guidelines relating to Oral Question Period.

Members on both sides of the House continue to be disorderly during Oral Question Period to the point where it is difficult to hear the question asked or the answer being given.

As has been the practice in the past, the Speaker is reluctant to continually intervene bearing in mind the short duration of our Question Period, but unless Members on both sides of the House exhibit some self discipline, the Chair will have no option but to intervene.

There has been an increasing tendency to interfere with the Chair's conduct of Question Period by both sides of the House, in that the Government interjects with a call for "question, question" while a question is being posed by the Opposition, and the Opposition interjects with "time, Mr. Speaker, time, Mr. Speaker" while the question is being answered.

I am certain both sides of the House in so interjecting are simply exhibiting a conscientious concern for application of the rules, but I would ask all Members to accept the assurance of the Chair, that such interjections are counter productive and tend to exacerbate disorder in the House. I am, therefore, asking Members on both sides of the House to refrain from such interjections. The Chair will be the judge of whether a question is too long, or an answer is too long.

In that regard, Members may be interested in knowing that questions and answers are timed on a daily basis and the tally varies from day to day and week to week. If Members are interested, these tallies are available in my office or the Clerk's office.

The Chair has also examined the *Blues* from yesterday's Question Period which demonstrate a classic example of the abuse of Question Period guidelines when an Honourable Member persisted in questioning on a matter which had been taken on notice, despite the fact that the Member had characterised his supplementaries as a "new question".

The Chair can do little to improve on the statement delivered in this House on April 8, 1999, relating to the conduct of Question Period, and for the assistance of Members who wish to refresh their memories on these guidelines, I have had a copy of that decision placed on the Members' desks.

It is hoped that the Members themselves take these suggestions seriously and improve the quality of Question Period, but the Chair proposes to intervene if the guidelines are being consistently ignored.
