The mailing lists have been compiled over the years to avoid duplication but because of the consolidation of the former Ministry of Transportation and Communications, Motor Vehicle Branch, and Ministry of Highways and Public Works Reports, and the existence of separate mailing lists in the past, a few recipients may have received more than one copy.

"4. \$25,179.44.

"5. Average cost of mailing was \$1 per copy."

With respect to a possible new major ferry terminal on or near Gabriola Island-

1. Is this proposal still under review by the Minister's ministry and/or British Columbia Ferry Corporation?
