Mr. *Berger* asked leave to move adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance and, after stating the matter, handed a written statement to Mr. Speaker as follows:—

“Pursuant to Standing Order 35, I rise to ask leave to make a motion for the adjournment of the House to discuss a definite matter of urgent public importance. The matter of urgent public importance is the continued dumping of mine tailings by Western Mines Limited into the waters of Myra Creek and Buttle Lake.”

Mr. Speaker stated that “urgency” within this rule does not apply to the matter itself, but it means “urgency of debate,” and that in his opinion the written statement did not disclose a matter indicating an urgent need for debate (Beauschene, 4th edition, page 90) and, in addition, the general subject-matter had been before the Courts and was one which did not involve more than the ordinary administration of the law. (May's Parliamentary Practice, 17th edition, page 366.)

An appeal was taken from the ruling of the Chair.

By leave of the House, the following question standing on the Order Paper in the name of Mr. *Nimsick* was withdrawn:—

153 Mr. *Nimsick* to ask the Hon. the Minister of Labour the following question:—

What was the total cost of the Royal Commission *re* the *Workmen's Compensation Act*?

155 Mr. *Harding* asked the Hon. the Minister of Industrial Development, Trade, and Commerce the following questions:—

1. What was the estimated value of refined and copper products (excluding completely manufactured products) imported into British Columbia from both domestic and foreign sources in the calendar years 1965 and 1966?

2. What was the estimated value of asbestos and asbestos cement basic products imported into British Columbia from both domestic and foreign sources in the calendar years 1965 and 1966?

3. What was the estimated value of iron and steel products (excluding completely manufactured products) imported into British Columbia from both domestic and foreign sources in the calendar years 1965 and 1966?

The Hon. *R. R. Loffmark* replied as follows:—

“ 1. \$4,589,646 in 1965 and \$7,985,076 in the first 10 months of 1966.

“ 2. \$762,115 in 1965 and \$619,509 in the first 10 months of 1966.

“ 3. \$50,561,446 in 1965 and \$44,667,995 in the first 10 months of 1966.

“ NOTE.—Statistics are not available on the interprovincial movement of the above products.”

160 Mr. *L. A. Williams* asked the Hon. the Minister of Agriculture the following questions:—

With respect to projects undertaken under the Canada land inventory:—

1. Since the inception of the plan to December 31, 1966, have any projects been undertaken in the West Vancouver-Howe Sound constituency?

2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, (a) how many of such projects have been completed, (b) how many of such projects are incomplete, and (c) have any reports been published in respect of completed projects?

The Hon. *F. X. Richter* replied as follows:—

“ 1. Yes. Socio-economic study of Pemberton Valley.

“ 2. (a) Field study completed for one, (b) analysis and interpretation presently being done, and (c) no published reports expected to be released until completion of all phases of inventory study in that area.”

161 Mr. *L. A. Williams* asked the Hon. the Minister of Agriculture the following questions:—

With respect to projects undertaken under the Federal-Provincial Rural Development Agreement, 1965-70:—

1. Since the inception of the agreement and up to December 31, 1966, have any projects been undertaken or authorized for the Pemberton Valley?

2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, (a) what was the nature of such projects and (b) what is the estimated cost to each of the Federal and Provincial Governments of such projects?

The Hon. *F. X. Richter* replied as follows:—

“ 1 and 2. No separate projects have been undertaken, except Pemberton Valley is included as an area being studied as part of the Initial Rural Development Research Study covering the whole Province. Leadership has also been given by the Department of Agriculture assisted by the University of British Columbia in study of local community resources by interested groups.”

Section 2 (2) (d): Amend by striking out paragraph (i) of the proposed clause (k) to subsection (2) of section 2 of the Act and substituting the following:—

“(k) (i) Where the deceased, immediately before his death, directly or indirectly, either alone or together with his spouse, father, mother, brother, sister, and his issue, or any one or more of them, controlled a corporation, the property situated in the Province and beneficially owned by the

corporation, but not exceeding in value the aggregate increase in the value of the beneficial interest or interests of beneficiaries in the capital and indebtedness of that corporation and any related corporation or corporations

- “(A) resulting from the transmission, transfer, cancellation, bequest, or gift of shares or evidences of indebtedness, or both, of the deceased within three years of the date of death, and
 “(B) not otherwise subject to duty under this Act;”.

The Hon. *W. D. Black* (Minister of Health Services and Hospital Insurance) presented the Seventieth Annual Report of the Public Health Services of British Columbia for the year ended December 31, 1966.

2 Mr. *Strachan* asked the Hon. the Premier and President of the Council the following questions:—

1. Were any printed copies of the Budget Speech for 1966 distributed to other than elected members?

2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, (a) how many were so distributed and (b) what was the total cost to the Government of the copies so distributed?

3. Did any source, other than the Government, pay for the printing and (or) distribution of the copies referred to in No. 2?

4. If the answer to No. 3 is yes, (a) who were the organizations and (or) persons concerned and (b) what was the total cost to them of printing and (or) distribution?

The Hon. *W. A. C. Bennett* replied as follows:—

“ 1. Yes.

“ 2. (a) 60,000 and (b) \$20,100.

“ 3. No, distribution not known as copies sent to individuals and organizations as requested.

“ 4. Not applicable.”

17 Mr. *Perrault* asked the Hon. the Premier the following question:—

With respect to the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, since 1945 has the Government of Canada granted any construction subsidies to this railroad? If the answer to the above is yes, (a) by years, what amounts have been granted for, and (b) which sections of the line?

The Hon. *W. A. C. Bennett* replied as follows:—

“ Yes. (a) 1951, \$825,000; 1953, \$403,500; 1957, \$500,000; 1958, \$750,000; and (b) 1951 and 1953, Quesnel to Prince George; 1957 and 1958, Prince George north for 50 miles.

“ NOTE.—Province has requested \$17,337,000 additional subsidy from the Government of Canada for remainder of line.”

19 Mr. *Perrault* asked the Hon. the Premier the following question:—

With respect to the British Columbia Hydro and Power Authority, during the 12-month period ended December 31, 1966, did the Authority authorize an advertising campaign or campaigns to promote the sale of its bonds? If the answer to the above is yes, (a) what were the commencement and termination dates of these campaigns; (b) by advertising media, how much was expended; (c) were the services of an advertising company retained; and (d) if the answer to the above is yes, what was the name of the company?

The Hon. *W. A. C. Bennett* replied as follows:—

“(a) March 31 to April 15, 1966; (b) space advertising, \$27,060.26; radio advertising, \$12,515.99; television advertising, \$10,694; production and mechanical, \$9,379.26; (c) yes; and (d) James Lovick Limited.”

21 Mr. *Perrault* asked the Hon. the Minister of Finance the following question:—

With respect to the British Columbia School Districts Capital Financing Authority, during the 12-month period ended December 31, 1966, did the Provincial Government authorize an advertising campaign to promote the sale of 6¼ per cent B.C. school bonds dated November 1, 1966, maturing November 1, 1986? If the answer to the above is yes, (a) which advertising company placed the campaign; (b) what was the total advertising and promotional budget; (c) by publication, how much was expended; (d) by radio station, how much was expended; (e) by television station, how much was expended; and (f) what was the total additional amount expended, if any?

The Hon. *W. A. C. Bennett* replied as follows:—

“ Yes. (a) James Lovick Limited; (b) \$29,431.95; (c) \$9,644.98; (d) \$9,308.35; (e) \$10,478.62; and (f) nil.”

94 Mr. *Shelford* asked the Hon. the Premier and President of the Council the following questions:—

With reference to British Columbia Hydro and Power Authority:—

1. What was the total number of gallons of bulk gasoline purchased by this department for the years 1964 and 1965?
2. What was the average price per gallon for each of these years?

Prayers by Father *W. H. Bullock*.

The Hon. *W. A. C. Bennett*, arising in his place, informed the House of the death of His Excellency General the Right Honourable Georges Philias Vanier.

By leave of the House, it was *Ordered* that the Hon. *W. A. C. Bennett* be permitted to move without notice a motion concerning the death of His Excellency.

The Hon. *W. A. C. Bennett* moved, seconded by Mr. *Strachan*,—

That this House go on record as expressing its deepest regret for the loss to the cause of brotherhood in the nation of Canada and also throughout the world, occasioned by the death on March 5, 1967, of His Excellency General the Right Honourable Georges Philias Vanier, Governor-General of Canada since 1959, and that the Speaker do convey to Madame Vanier, her sons and daughter, the sincere sympathy of the members of the Legislative Assembly of British Columbia and the people of this Province.

The Hon. *W. A. C. Bennett* presented the following statement:—

“The loss to Canada of this distinguished Canadian and noble head of state will be mourned, not only in the Province of British Columbia and the nation of

Canada, but throughout the world by all those people who love freedom, respect the democratic process, cherish international goodwill, esteem tolerance and understanding within and without the nation, foster family relationships, and sanctify individual liberties of word, thought, and worship above all else.

“Governor-General Vanier did all of these things, and by his example on the field of battle, at the conference table, and in his private life inspired others to do likewise.

“His career will stand, for this and later generations of Canadians, as a model for all those who aspire to serve their God, their country, and their own high personal standards with dignity and devotion.

“As a young soldier he served his country with distinction, being wounded and mentioned in dispatches, and winning for his valour the Distinguished Service Order, the Military Cross and Bar, and rising, in two wars, to the rank of major-general. Among the many military and civilian honours that came to him were awards for distinguished service from both the United States and France.

“As a diplomat his services were valued as a Canadian delegate to many League of Nations functions, from its very formative years. Though his fame was legend on the battlefield, he fought with equal determination at disarmament conferences. He was stationed in the office of the High Commissioner for Canada to London, and in Paris as Canadian Minister before and after the Second World War. During the war he was Canadian Minister to European governments in exile in London.

“As a humanitarian he and Madame Vanier organized and played host to a Government House conference on family relations and encouraged the founding of the Vanier Institute of the Family. It commissioned sociological studies of the increasing complexity of modern living and its effect on the unity and integrity of the family unit which, more than anything else, he wanted to sustain and strengthen. He was deeply concerned and actively engaged in this activity even in the last days and weeks of his life. Prior to that, as he travelled the great width of this country and spoke to Canadians in every walk of life, this particular aspect of their general welfare was one of his greatest concerns. The other was his passionate desire for a united and understanding Canada.

“As a Canadian he was a great force for unity. He was the second native-born Governor-General and the first French-speaking. He said of the two races that made his country: ‘They go forward hand in hand to make Canada a great country, hand in hand also with Canadians of every origin, irrespective of race or creed.’

“And in his New Year’s message just two months ago he said:—

“‘I am tired of hearing people around me say and write that we are a lot of rudderless people on the road to nowhere. We have a Canadian identity, we must begin to live up to the high standard it embodies.

“‘The history of man tells the tale of great empires which fell, not from outward assault, but from inward decay and moral disintegration.

“‘How often in the emptiness of our society do the brave young shoots of nobility and compassion wither and die on the barren ground of material values.’

“This was the nobility of the man—a simple man really, but one with deep personal faith and humility, great courage, and a desire to serve. I am sure that as an old soldier and statesman he would prefer that the Legislature carry on instead of adjourning for a period of mourning. A public memorial service will be held in St. Andrew’s Cathedral, in Victoria, on Wednesday, at 11 a.m., and I know that all members will pay their personal respects at that time.”

At the request of Mr. Speaker, the House expressed its approval of the motion by standing in silence.
