That we are of opinion, and verily believe, that the said John Nicholson is in the habit of obtaining contracts for Government work in the names of other persons, he at the same time being the party reaping the benefit of the contract, which amounts to passing his own work.

We, therefore, humbly pray your Honorable House may be pleased to appoint a Committee to investigate the matter, with power to call for persons and papers.

### PETITION.

To the Honorable the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, in Parliament assembled.

The Petition of Robert Paterson Rithet, John Herbert Turner, James Eliphet McMillan, Patrick McTiernan, and Benjamin William Pearse,

### HUMBLY SHEWETH:

- 1. That your Petitioners are the Trustees of the Ross Bay Cemetery.
- 2. That upon the request of different religious bodies or churches in the City of Victoria, your petitioners resolved, under the "Cemetery Ordinance, 1870," and subject to the approval of His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, to allot distinct portions of the Cemetery to each of such churches.
- 3. That on the 29th July, 1873, His Honor the Lieuteuant-Governor approved of such allotments.
- 4. That such allotments were so made to four churches, namely, the Roman, the Presbyterian, the Wesleyan Methodist, and the Episcopal Churches.
- 5. That recently, upon application being made, a portion was allotted to the Reformed Episcopal Church, subject to the approval of the His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor.
  - 6. That portions of the Cemetery have been reserved for general use.
- 7. That by virtue of allotment the clergy of each church have the exclusive right of performing the burial service in the ground allotted to that church.
- 8. That, by consent, the clergy of one church frequently perform service in the ground of another church.
- 9. That if the aforesaid exclusive right had been denied to, or should now be taken away from, the Roman and Episcopal Churches, those Churches would be driven out of the Cemetery, and thus deprived of a benefit to which as part of the public they were and are clearly entitled.
- 10. That your Petitioners are informed that a Bill has been introduced in your Honorable House which, if passed, will have the effect of abrogating the aforesaid exclusive right, and thus inflict grievous injury upon the Roman and Episcopal Churches, and especially upon such members of these Churches as have relations buried or have secured lots in their particular ground.
- 11. That your Petitioners believe that public sentiment is in favor of retaining the existing arrangement.

Your Petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Honorable House may be pleased not to pass any Act to abrogate the aforesaid exclusive right.

And your Petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray, &c., &c.
