4. What was the total amount spent for this purpose during the fiscal year 1969 and what was the total amount spent during the fiscal year 1970?

The Hon. R. G. Williston replied as follows:

"1. Yes. However, the question refers specifically to 'pulp-mill effluent control' while the advertising relates generally to 'registration of discharges.'

155 Mr. *Hartley* asked the Hon. the Minister of Industrial Development, Trade, and Commerce the following questions:

1. Has the Provincial Government applied for assistance under the Federal Department of Regional Economic Expansion (DREE)?

2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, (a) what projects have been applied for under DREE and (b) what projects have received grants under DREE?

The Hon. *W. McT. Skillings* replied as follows:

"1. Yes.

"2. (a) Strong representations have been made by this Government to the Department of Regional Economic Expansion to designate 'special areas' where direct Federal Government assistance would be given to local districts, particularly in the field of infrastructure development. Such requests have been made for Northern Vancouver Island and the entire northern area of British Columbia. Submissions have also been made for the designation of additional Provincial regions under the *Regional Development Incentives Act*.

"(b) No assistance has been received under the 'special area' incentives programme. Ten grants have been made to private industry in the Kootenay designated region under the operation of the *Regional Development Incentives Act*."

180 Mr. *Hartley* asked the Hon. the Minister of Recreation and Conservation the following questions:

1. Did the Department of Recreation and Conservation, through the Nicola Valley Rod and Gun Club, undertake a clean-up programme on Alleyne, Kentucky, Harmon, Davis, and Peter Hope Lakes?

2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, (a) was the project considered to be worthwhile, (b) will this type of project be considered and undertaken in the future, and (c) was or will the full moneys, as originally promised for this project, be paid to the group which assisted in the clean-up?

The Hon. *W. K. Kiernan* replied as follows:

"1. Yes.

"2. (a) Not determined to date, (b) yes, and (c) yes, to extent of their expenditures, as promised."
