139 Mr. *McGeer* asked the Hon. the Minister of Lands, Forests, and Water Resources the following questions:

1. Is Lot 12, Block 7, Plan 818, Stewart Townsite, owned by the Crown?
2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, has the above lot been leased to any firm or individual?
3. If the answer to No. 2 is yes, to whom was the lot leased and when?
4. If the answer to No. 2 is no, then is the Minister aware of any trespass?
5. If the answer to No. 4 is yes, when did he become aware of the trespass and what action is planned by the Minister regarding any trespass?

The Hon. *R. G. Williston* replied as follows:

- "1. Yes.
- "2. No, however, it is under application to lease by P. J. Curran for the site of an industrial catering camp and motel. This application is dated May 7, 1971.
- "3. Answered by No. 2.
- "4. The Department is aware of the presence of a triple Atco trailer on the property.
- "5. Presence of trailer was noted during an inspection on October 19, 1971. No action is contemplated by my Department at this time due to the fact that Mr.

Curran is involved in a Court case with the Village of Stewart which is still pending before the District Magistrate. No disposition of the land will be made until the Court case is concluded.”

48 Mrs. *Dailly* asked the Hon. the Minister of Rehabilitation and Social Improvement the following questions:

With reference to day-care centres for children—

1. Are any day-care centres receiving financial subsidies from the Government?
2. If the answer to No. 1 is yes, (a) how many centres are there, (b) what is the formula of the subsidy paid, and (c) what was the total amount of subsidy paid to each relevant centre during 1971?

The Hon. *P. A. Gaglardi* replied as follows:

“1. Yes.

“2. (a) 125, (b) *Group Day Care*: The following payments are made for each day the child attends. When the child has attended fifteen days or more in the months, payment will be made for every day the centre was operating that month. (The number of days attended should be shown correctly, but the maximum amount payable entered for the child.)

“PLAN B: Families whose assets and income, reviewed by one of the designated agencies using the Homemaker Financial Eligibility Test, shows that they have only \$11 to \$25 residual monthly to pay for the full-day care required (i.e., \$22 to \$50 if two children must attend) qualify for this plan. A payment of \$2.40 per day per child from a qualified family may be authorized for attendance at *any* licensed day-care centre. Authorization will be forwarded to the centre on the attached Form A and families should renew it every six months.

“PLAN C: Families whose assets and income, reviewed by one of the designated agencies using the Homemaker Financial Eligibility Test, shows that they have \$10 or less residual monthly to pay for full-day care of a child (i.e., \$20 if two children must attend, children-in-care, or children of families who are in receipt of Social Allowance qualify for a payment under this plan. The payment per day per child from a qualified family shall be \$3.40 per day for attendance at *any* licensed day-care centre. Authorization will be forwarded to the centre on the attached Form A and families should renew it every six months. When this payment does not equal the full fee charged paying parents at the centre and the costs per child of the centre, the operator may apply through the administering office, to the Superintendent of Child Welfare for review of their finances and possible upward revision of the rate.

“PLAN A: Centres managed by nonprofit groups which accept the conditions below qualify for a payment of \$1 per day per child for children not qualified for

Plan B or C. The centres are required to meet the following conditions in addition to being licensed:

"1. At least 10 per cent of their enrolment in any month must qualify for the Plan C payment.

"2. Must have submitted their proposed budget for the coming fiscal year on the attached Form B.

"3. Must submit their audited financial statement for the past fiscal year to the Superintendent of Child Welfare through the administering agency as soon as possible after the end of their fiscal year.

"4. Must charge a sliding fee to all parents except those qualifying for Plan C. The maximum fee charged shall not be less than the *per diem* cost of the preceding year determined from their financial statement, or the projected cost for the coming year as shown by their budget.

"5. Agree to inform the Superintendent of Child Welfare at least one full month beforehand of any decision to terminate the operation. Such notification to include a full report on the current financial situation as well as an explanation of any unusual community conditions causing their decision.

"*Children Receiving After School Care Only:* Where a licensed pre-school centre or a licensed or approved home provides care after school hours, payment for children shall be: Plan C, not more than \$1.25 per half day; or Plan B, not more than \$0.75 per half day.

"During school holidays when full day care is provided, the rate will increase to either: (a) The regular Plan B or C *per diem* rate at a licensed family day-care home; or (b) at a licensed centre, the full day rate shall be: Plan C, up to \$3 per day; or Plan B, up to \$2 per day.
