Your Select Standing Committee on Private Bills and Standing Orders begs leave to report as follows:—

That in view of the fact that the promoters have paid House fees in connection with Bill No. 50, being the "Vancouver Incorporation Act, 1900, Amendment Act, 1917," as well as double fees under section 72 of the Rules, this Committee recommends that no House fees be charged for Bill No. 51, intituled "The Vancouver Incorporation Act, 1900, Amendment Act, 1917, No. 2," the provisions of which were included in Bill No. 50 and separated under instructions from the House.

Your Committee further recommends that the time for reporting Bills to the House be extended from April 11th to April 25th, 1917.

Mr. Anderson asked the Hon. the Minister of Mines the following questions:-

- 1. What (if any) inquiries have been made of the Department of Mines with regard to the tonnage of zinc ores in British Columbia during the past two years; from whom, and what replies were given, and when?
- 2. What inquiries were made as to the feasibility or opportunities for zinc-smelting in the Province or in Alberta; by whom, and when, and what replies were made thereto?
- 3. What was (a) the tonnage of zinc sulphide ore and zinc sulphide concentrates and (b) what was the tonnage of carbonate zinc ores produced and exported to the American smelters in 1916, and to what smelters was each of same sent? From what mines sent, and what was the maximum and minimum, and also average tenor of the shipments of each kind of ore in gold, silver, copper, zinc and lead, iron and lime? On what basis was the settlement made by each smelter? What was the maximum and minimum railway freight rates from mines to said smelters?
- 4. What were the settlement bases for these kinds of ore made by American smelters prior to the year 1915?
- 5. What effort (if any) did the Department in 1915 and 1916 make to get fair treatment rates for British Columbia zinc ores? What efforts (if any) is it now making? What was the approximate loss in price of zinc ores shipped to American smelters in 1916, through settlement on the new bases instead of the bases prevailing prior to 1915: (1) On said ores of maximum tenor; (2) on said ores of minimum tenor; (3) on the average tenor of all the ores shipped in 1916?
- 6. What was and is the rate of American Customs duty paid on zinc ores, and on what basis is the net value of the ore upon which the duty is paid calculated?
- 7. What is the total estimated sum paid to transportation companies for hauling these zinc ores to American smelters in 1916, and what sum to the United States Government in Customs duty?
- 8. What tonnage of (1) sulphide zinc ores and (2) of carbonate zinc ores were sent in 1916 to Trail, B.C., for treatment in the zinc electrolytic plant there, and from what mines? What were the maximum and minimum contents of each kind of ore in gold, silver, copper, zinc, and lead, and on what basis is settlement for such ores made?

The Hon. Mr. Sloan replied as follows:-

"1. (Lettergram.)

"'New York, N.Y., March 18th-19th, 1916. Hon. Lorne A. Campbell, Minister of Mines, Victoria, B.C. Kindly wire me immediately average daily production zinc-blende concentrates, Kootenay District, whether shipped or not, but exclude Sullivan ore sent Trail; also state if production is rapidly increasing and your estimate daily output six months hence. Have capitalists favourably entertaining smelter for Province's ore, giving producers better price, if satisfied about adequate ore supply blende. Production: Ought now exceed hundred tons.—Smith Curtis.'

(Reply.)

"'Victoria, B.C., March 20th, 1916. Smith Curtis, Imperial Hotel, Broadway, New York. Zinc ore output of Province for the calendar year nineteen fifteen exclusive of Sullivan ore to Trail was approximately as follows: Zinc-blende crude ore one thousand tons, concentrates ten thousand seven hundred tons, and crude zinc carbonate ore five thousand tons. If prevailing conditions continue estimate production for nineteen sixteen will approximate fourteen hundred tons crude blende, seventeen thousand tons blende concentrates, and six thousand tons crude carbonate ore.—Lorne Campbell.'

"'Hotel Imperial, New York, 21st March, 1916. Hon. Lorne Campbell, Minister of Mines, Victoria. Dear Mr. Campbell,—Thank you for telegram received from you this morning rezince.

ore and concent. shipments. I am afraid your intelligence department needs waking up. From one of the owners of the H.B. and Zincton mines at Salmo, I have a letter saying output was 50 tons a day, and when a light railway is built to the mines this year, a daily output of 300 tons could be had. A later letter from a Salmo man tells me 60 tons a day is being shipped; at 50 tons per day, the output would be 18,000 tons for 1916, not 6,000 as stated in your telegram. I look for at least 25,000 tons being shipped from these mines alone in 1916 even if no railway is built. As to blende shipments my information is not satisfactory, but it should be three times that of 1915, for nearly all the blende shipments of that year were in the last six months of it, and if the average for that six months is double in 1916, it will mean four times as much output in the latter as there was in the former year. With new mines entering the shipping list it is not improbable that the blende output of 1916 will be five times that of 1915. It would certainly be were the smelters paying a more reasonable price for the ore. I would have secured this through the sale of Frank smelter and may yet; but the want of an official up-to-date report on B.C. zinc and almost continuous illness have delayed my negotiations.—Yours very truly, SMITH CURTIS.'

(Reply.)

- "'Victoria, B.C., March 31st, 1916. Smith Curtis, Esq., Hotel Imperial, 31 & 32 Broadway, New York. Dear Mr. Curtis,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 21st inst. in answer to my telegram, which I regret to say does not coincide with your ideas. The figures given you the 1915 output are from Government reports; as to what the output will be in 1916 there is room for difference of opinion. I might further state I have had the estimate revised and I have no alterations to make in the figures sent you, much as I should like personally to see them higher; but I note that the output of zinc in 1915 is in quantity some 65 per cent. higher than in 1914, while the estimate for 1916 for blende, which is what your telegram inquired about, is about 60 per cent. higher than in 1915. It seems to me that if we progress at this rate it is very satisfactory and is all I care to say officially. As regards the carbonate zinc ores—which were not included in your telegram—that all come from a group of mines near our old home town that put out a little over 5,000 tons in 1915, and we have no information here as to what the company operating this particular property intend doing in 1916, but as you mention you are in close touch with these mines and the owners you may be able to form a better opinion than we can, and I would be only too pleased to have your opinion as to what they propose doing during the coming year.—With kindest regards, Yours very truly, L. A. CAMPBELL.'

Average tenor of sulphide ores, 41½ per cent. zinc; average tenor of concentrates, 43.2 per cent. zinc; average tenor carbonate ores, 26.6 per cent zinc. Complete analysis of ores not known. Basis of settlement is a private arrangement between the buyer and the seller, as also are freight rates.
- "4. No official knowledge; the terms of various U.S. smelters differ and are a matter of private contract between the seller and buyer.
 - "5. (a.) Government subsidized zinc-refinery at Nelson. (b.) Answered by No. 3.
- "6. No official information, but understand zinc ores are appraised under paragraph L, section 111 of United States Tariff Act, at 10 per cent. ad valorem.
 - "7. No official information.
- "8. The Trail smelter of Consol. M. and S. Co. received from its own mine (the Sullivan) ore consisting of mixed lead and zinc sulphides that in the ordinary way would not be classed as zinc ore, nor ordinarily saleable as such; from this they extracted a proposition of the zinc contents, the residue being treated for the lead contents. Strictly speaking, there are no sulphide 'zinc ores' from the Sullivan. Trail received about 1,645 tons zinc sulphide ore from the Lucky Jim and a trial shipment of about 112 tons carbonate ore from the H.B. Mine. No official information as to complete analysis or basis of settlement."

Mr. Pooley objected to the motion, on the ground that as the report was, on the admission of the Chairman, not the whole report as made by the Committee, the same was incomplete, was not the report of the Committee, and could not be received.

Mr. Speaker Weart sustained the objection.

The report was thereupon withdrawn.

On the motion of the Hon. the Minister of Finance, seconded by the Hon. the Attorney-General, it was Resolved.—

That a Supply be granted to His Majesty, and that this House do resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole on Tuesday next, April 17th, to consider the Resolution.

On the motion of Mr. Bowser, Bill (No. 25) intituled "An Act for the Protection of the Widows and Children of Deceased Soldiers and Sailors" was introduced, read a first time, and Ordered to be read a second time on Monday next.

The Hon. Mr. Oliver moved, seconded by the Hon. Dr. King,-

That all letters, papers, vouchers, and documents relating to the payment of \$7,920 to Andrew Laidlaw as a refund of moneys paid on account of lands purchased or sought to be purchased from the Province of British Columbia be referred to the Public Accounts Committee, with instructions to inquire into the whole question of the payment of the moneys above referred to; and with further instructions to report to this House their findings as to the person or persons responsible for the payment before mentioned.

A debate arose, which was, on the motion of Mr. Ross, adjourned until the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Bowser asked the Hon. the Provincial Secretary the following questions:-

- 1. What was the practice on the 24th day of November last followed by the late Government dealing with allowances paid to members of the Civil Service who had enlisted for overseas service?
 - 2. When was such practice discontinued?
 - 3. What is the practice now followed by the present Government?
- 4. Has any person who has enlisted for overseas service since the 24th day of November last been given any allowance?
 - 5. If so, who are they, and what are the reasons for giving same?

The Hon. Dr. MacLean replied as follows:-

The difference between military and civil pay, or a specified portion thereof, allowed to the dependents of Civil Servants on military duty; provided that such Civil Servants were permanent or had had twelve months' continuous service previous to the 4th day of August, 1914. Each case dealt with by the Civil Service Commission upon the production of an affidavit as to dependents, certificate of Commanding Officer, etc.
- "2. Practice has not been discontinued, but a regulation was made on the 27th day of December, 1916, providing that before enlisting a Civil Servant must first obtain the permission of the head of the Department in which he is employed.

- "5. A. R. Bamford, N. P. Blandy, A. Davies, A. M. Exley, E. P. Fox, G. P. Goddard, R. N. C. Hemberow, B. Jones, J. R. Mountain, J. Pollard, J. M. Smith, N. Taylor, D. Thomas, F. M. Ward, and A. Waters. Regulations complied with in each case."

Mr. Bowser asked the Hon, the Attorney-General the following questions:—

 - 4. Who has been appointed to said staff since the 24th day of November last?

 - 6. Are they appointed permanently or temporarily?
 - 7. What are their ages?
 - 8. Where did they each reside before receiving such appointments?

The Hon. Mr. Macdonald replied as follows:-

- "1. A. V. Pineo, W. B. Colvin, W. F. Bridge, and E. C. Wilderspin. (In addition, three clerks on active service.)
- "2. A. V. Pineo, appointed April 1st, 1913; W. B. Colvin, appointed May, 1908; W. F. Bridge, appointed March, 1911; and E. C. Wilderspin, appointed August, 1911.
- "3. A. V. Pineo, \$303.33 per month; W. B. Colvin, \$155 per month; W. F. Bridge, \$108 per month; and E. C. Wilderspin, \$108 per month.

- "4. A. M. Johnson, G. L. MacInnes, Miss L. McLeod, Miss N. Grist, and Mrs. L. Digby. (In addition to above, H. Langley, Miss F. L. Wright, and Miss E. H. McGurran have been temporarily employed for short periods as stenographers. They are not now employed.)
- "5. A. M. Johnson, \$335 per month; G. L. MacInnes, \$90 per month; Miss L. McLeod, \$80 per month; Miss N. Grist, \$2.50 per day; and Mrs. L. Digby, \$2.50 per day.

- 5. Why was he dismissed?
- 6. What notice of dismissal did he receive?

The Hon. Mr. Pattullo replied as follows:-

- "2. Since October, 1909.
- "3. Yes.
- "4. At the end of the past fiscal year.
- "5. Position discontinued.
- "6. Notified at beginning of March."

Mr. Ross asked the Hon, the Minister of Lands the following questions:-

- 1. Was C. A. Mix, of Grand Forks, employed in the Forest Branch?
- 2. When was he appointed?
- 3. What were his duties?
- 4. What salary was he paid?
- 5. Has he been dismissed?
- 6. Why was he dismissed?

The Hon. Mr. Pattullo replied as follows:-

Mr. Hall asked the Hon. the Minister of Railways the following questions:-

 - 3. What are particulars of amount and character of such work not so done?
 - 4. What are the names of sub-contractors on said line?

- 6. How much has been released by Government with respect to construction of whole of said Alberni branch?
- 7. Was any money paid through Dominion Government loans by way of advances on this line?
 - 8. If so, how much?

Mr. Anderson asked the Hon. the Minister of Public Works the following question:-

What is the total mileage of roads and also of trails under the supervision of the Government in each Provincial electoral district?

The Hon. Dr. King replied as follows:-

"The mileage is compiled from the returns for the year ending March, 1916; the mileage for the new electoral districts has not been compiled: Alberni, 534 miles roads, 194 miles trails; Atlin, 308 miles roads, 375 miles trails; Cariboo, 2,376 miles roads, 213 miles trails; Chilliwack, 169 miles roads; Columbia, 373 miles roads, 645 miles trails; Comox, 347 miles roads, 53 miles trails; Cowichan, 188 miles roads; Cranbrook, 599 miles roads, 291 miles trails; Delta, 127 miles roads; Dewdney, 281 miles roads, 36 miles trails; Esquimalt, 372 miles roads, 25 miles trails; Fernie, 352 miles roads, 136 miles trails; Grand Forks, 339 miles roads, 67 miles trails; Greenwood, 170 miles roads, 27 miles trails; Islands, 233 miles roads, 6 miles trails; Kamloops, 1,627 miles roads, 45 miles trails; Kaslo, 197 miles roads, 571 miles trails; Lillooet, 1,605 miles roads, 506 miles trails; Nanaimo City, 53 miles roads; Newcastle, 219 miles roads; Okanagan, 1,361 miles roads, 676 miles trails; Revelstoke, 161 miles roads, 305 miles trails; Richmond, 163 miles roads, 90 miles trails; Similkameen, 826 miles roads, 337 miles trails; Skeena, 967 miles roads, 967 miles trails; Slocan, 241 miles roads, 287 miles trails; Yale, 735 miles roads, 152 miles trails; Ymir, 715 miles roads, 396 miles trails; total, 15,638 miles roads; total, 5,400 miles trails."

Bill (No. 13) intituled "An Act to amend the 'Water Act, 1914'" was again committed. Progress reported.

Committee to sit again on Monday next.

The House resumed the adjourned debate on the second reading of Bill (No. 11) intituled "An Act to make Provision for a Mineral Survey of the Province of British Columbia and for the Development of the Mineral Resources of the said Province, including Provisions in Aid of Prospectors and Miners and for the Protection of Wage-earners and Investors,"

Bill read a second time.

To be committed on Monday next.

The House resumed the adjourned debate on the second reading of Bill (No. 21) intituled "An Act respecting a certain By-election holden in Vancouver City Electoral District on the Twenty-sixth Day of February, 1916."

Mr. Cowper moved the adjournment of the debate.

The motion was negatived.

After further debate, on the motion of Mr. Ross the debate was adjourned until Monday next.

The Hon. Mr. Sloan presented to Mr. Speaker a Message from His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, which read as follows:—

The Lieutenant-Governor transmits herewith a Bill intituled "An Act to amend the 'Complex Ore Process Aid Act,'" and recommends the same to the Legislative Assembly.

Resolution and Bill reported.

Bill introduced and read a first time.

Second reading at the next sitting.

Mr. Bowser asked the Hon. the Premier the following questions:-

- 1. Was Mr. Justice Gregory appointed by the late Government under the "Public Inquiries Act" to look into the claims of certain settlers in the Esquimalt & Nanaimo Railway Belt for under-surface rights?
 - 2. What was the date of said appointment?
 - 3. Did Mr. Justice Gregory proceed with said inquiry?
 - 4. Has he finished said work?
 - 5. If not, is he still carrying on the investigation?
 - 6. If not carrying it on, why has he not done so?
 - 7. Has he made any report, either interim or final?
 - 8. If so, what is the nature of same?

The Hon. Mr. Brewster replied as follows:-

- "1. Yes.
- "2. August 2nd, 1916.
- "3. Inquiry was started.
- "4. No.
- "5. No.
- "6. The learned Commissioner advises that owing to the fact that the Commission to inquire into the claims arising out of the riots in the district of Nanaimo not being finished at date of August 23rd, 1916, when the Commission which is the subject of this inquiry was opened, the Commissioner found it impossible to proceed with this work. The sittings of this Commission were adjourned indefinitely, but subsequently resumed at Nanaimo on Monday, September 11th, 1916. The learned Commissioner sat on September 11th and 12th, 1916, when representations were made on behalf of a large number of settlers requesting adjournment for a considerable time, apparently in the hope that the scope of the Commission would be enlarged. Subsequently, on September 15th, 1916, the learned Commissioner was requested not to proceed for at least one month in order to give time for application to extend the scope of the Commission. The learned Commissioner advises that he continuously was engaged in taking evidence in the Riots Commission until the end of November, when his judicial duties rendered it impossible for him to do any further work under either Commission.
