Bill (No. 79) read a second time and *Ordered* to be placed on the Orders of the Day for committal at the next sitting after today.

### Mr. Speaker delivered his reserved decision as follows:

#### Honourable Members:

At the two o'clock sitting on Tuesday, the Honourable Second Member for Okanagan South raised what he described as a matter of privilege with respect to allegations against him attributed to the Leader of the Opposition.

The Honourable Member for Okanagan South summarized his complaint and tabled a witnessed statement by himself and a further witnessed statement signed by the Honourable Member for Mackenzie. Finally, the Member for Okanagan South tendered a motion he would propose to move should the Chair find a *prima facie* breach of privilege.

Contained within the statements referred to above were allegations of certain conversations between the Second Member for Okanagan South, the Member for Mackenzie and the First Member for Nanaimo.

The First Member for Nanaimo spoke briefly to the matter of privilege and denied the remarks attributed to him in the tabled statements.

The gist of the complaint of the Member for Okanagan South was that he was offended by remarks attributed to the Leader of the Opposition made outside the House. The Chair, in this situation, has no evidence as to whether or not the attributed remarks were actually made by the Honourable Leader of the Opposition and, in any event, does not have the power to order a withdrawal of words spoken outside this Chamber. While the Member for Okanagan South may have a grievance which he has brought to the Chair's attention, the matter, as presented, does not qualify *prima facie* as a case which would permit the Member to move the appropriate motion.

I now turn to the matter raised by the Honourable Member for Mackenzie whose complaint was based on remarks attributed to the Leader of the Opposition, apparently made on television. Again, in this case, there is no transcript available for the Chair to examine relating to those remarks and, in addition, the Honourable Member for Mackenzie has not tendered with his complaint the appropriate motion, and accordingly this matter fails to qualify, *prima facie*, as a matter of privilege.

The Chair wishes to make a further observation, which I hope will be of assistance to the Members. Unless remarks objected to are made in the House (or a Committee thereof and have been reported to the House) the Chair is powerless to request a withdrawal. Even when, in appropriate circumstances, the Chair has requested such a withdrawal, he does not have further power to order an apology. Speakers throughout the Commonwealth have stated, time and again, that while an order from the Chair makes a withdrawal mandatory, the matter of an apology is left to the conscience of the individual Member.

Finally, the Chair cannot but help observe that the recent proliferation of complaints presented as matters of privilege does little to enhance the dignity of this Chamber and I would earnestly urge Members to consider their material with considerable care before rising on a matter which they describe as a matter of privilege.

### Honourable Members:

Earlier today the Honourable First Member for Victoria sought to invoke the provisions of Standing Order 35 and provided the Chair with a written statement of the matter, namely, "the current crisis with respect to the aboriginal peoples of British Columbia over their longstanding grievances."

The Government House Leader made representations to the Chair that Standing Order 35 could not be invoked as the "current crisis" had, in fact, been ongoing for some days and therefore the application by the Honourable First Member for Victoria ought to have been made previously; in addition, the interim report of the Premier's Council on Native Affairs was yesterday tabled in the House. The Chair does not consider the tabling of that report to be in any way relevant.

However, it is stated in the 16th edition of May's Parliamentary Practice, page 370, and I quote:

"If the matter is not raised at the earliest opportunity, it fails in urgency . . ."

The *Journals* of this House disclose that on numerous occasions earlier Speakers of this Assembly have consistently held that delay in raising a matter under Standing Order 35 is fatal to the application. The Chair, while recognizing that the matter raised is of very great consequence, is nevertheless bound to apply the rules the House has seen fit to adopt. The application must fail as the requirements of Standing Order 35 have not been fulfilled.
