In the House, Mr. Speaker delivered a ruling as follows:

#### Honourable Members:

An examination of the Hansard debates for Tuesday, March 24, 1981, including the authorities quoted by the Leader of the Opposition, reveals detail of the matter the Committee has asked the Chair to consider and rule upon. The motion reads as follows:

"That this House express the view that the Minister of Forests must resign his portfolio as a result of his admission that he has been responsible for knowingly presenting to this House Estimates of Expenditure which are, by the Minister's own admission, not true estimates."

The Honourable Members will be aware that it is the Speaker's duty, upon a matter of privilege being raised, to decide whether the matter has been raised at the earliest opportunity, and secondly, does the matter, on the face of it, appear to be a *prima facie* case of privilege.

On the question as to whether or not the matter has been raised at the earliest opportunity, one must consider the gist of the complaint in the context of the proceedings in the House and in the Committee.

As I understand the complaint, it relates to an honourable member knowingly presenting to this House Estimates of Expenditure which are not true estimates. I have examined the Estimates presently before the Committee of Supply, being the Estimates for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1982, and in particular have directed my attention to the estimates of the Ministry of Forests. It is noted that the Summary of Estimates contained a total for expenditure followed by an entry described in the following words: "Less efficiencies achieved to control government growth."

I should also note at this time that the Estimates for the Ministry of Forests for the year ending March 31, 1980, refer to "recruitment savings", and the same words appear for 1981 without objection.

A perusal of the Hansard reports of Monday, March 9, 1981, reveal that the Minister of Finance, in delivering the Budget Speech, at page 34, refers to the request to each ministry "having been asked to reduce the growth of government spending to achieve total savings of \$61,000,000."

The Minister further states within the same speech, "With these expenditure restraint measures in place it has been possible to keep operating expenditure in 1981–82 down to \$6.61 billion."

While it would appear that such a detailed examination goes into the merit of the question of privilege, rather than the *prima facie* aspect of privilege, it must be pointed out here that the very heart of the complaint is founded upon a presentation of false documents with intent to deceive the House, or Committees thereof.

Dealing with the question as to whether or not the matter was raised at the earliest opportunity, I would observe that the Estimates disclosing the reduction in the Votes were tabled on March 9, 1981.

It appears to the Chair that the remarks of the Minister of Forests in the Committee of Supply yesterday did no more than confirm the earlier statements made by the Minister of Finance during his budget address on March 9th last, with respect to the budgetary process, which statements are also reflected in the content of the Estimates themselves, as referred to the Committee of Supply, also on the 9th day of March last.

Any further examination of the detail of this matter must, of necessity, get into the merit of the case, but bearing in mind the Chair's limited terms of reference at this stage of the proceeding. I am unable to find, in this instance, a *prima facie* breach of privilege. The Member may consider that he has a grievance but all members will be aware that the precedents on the law of privilege are numerous and restrictive, and the material being disclosed here does not pass the rigid tests as I conceive them to be, and I so rule.

2. How much of this cost has been assigned to (a) background studies; (b)

engineering works; and (c) construction expenditures?

3. How much has been spent as of March 9, 1981 (a) in total; (b) on background studies; (c) on engineering works; and (d) on construction expenditures?

The Hon. R. H. McClelland replied as follows:

- "1. Total anticipated cost: Direct, \$646,956,000; overhead, \$76,343,000; interest, \$99,849,000; totalling, \$823,148,000. The above direct costs are inflated to the in-service date.
- "2. Breakdown of the direct costs is: Background studies, \$4,780,000; engineering works, \$18,354,000; construction expenditures, \$623,822,000; totalling, \$646,956,000. The forecast overhead and interest figures are not prepared in a manner which would allow a split in the above segments.
- "3. Costs as at February 28, 1981, are: Direct—background studies, \$4,086,000; engineering works, \$4,272,000; construction expenditures, \$57,532,000. Overhead, \$7,202,000; interest, \$4,405,000; totalling, \$77,497,000. The request asked for costs as at March 9, 1981, but Hydro's monthly accounting cycle allows them to report costs only to February 28th."

And then the House adjourned at 6.01 p.m.
