Issue has been an on-going question; emergence of new information does not, in itself, make matter one of urgency, 37, 43; 47, 48-49.

On-going nature of the issue has effect of taking the matter outside the scope of Standing Order 35, 37, 43.

Ordinary parliamentary opportunity to raise and debate the issue at hand available through estimates; also, comments about other Members inappropriate under Standing Order 35, 82, 86.

While the issue at hand is a most serious issue with repercussions for the economy in the Kamloops area and throughout British Columbia, the test of urgency is not met under Standing Order 35, 192, 193.

The Member rose and moved the motion to adjourn the House before making a statement; urgency of debate is paramount, not the urgency of the matter; there are other reasonable opportunities for debating, 200, 206.

PRIVILEGE:

Matter belongs in category of a dispute between Members as to facts, 33, 53-54.

Representations, arguments and disagreements occurring in Committees, or disagreements between Members of a Committee occurring elsewhere, are not a proper subject matter to be brought to the floor of this House; responsibility rests with LAMC or other appropriate Committee, 10, 11, 14, 16-17; Member entitled to make personal statement after considering material. Personal statement guidelines, 16.

Asides made by Members not in possession of the floor can hardly constitute the foundation for a matter of privilege, 35, 44.

The decision of July 15, 1996, dealt with substantially the same matters of privilege we are dealing with today, and that decision examined the budgetary circumstances in detail and, based on the evidence presented at that time, concluded that the matter raised at that time did not fulfil the conditions of parliamentary privilege, the new evidence (Morfitt Report) did not disclose necessary *mens rea*, 199, 206, 214-216.

Chair's conclusion was that the Honourable House Leader's statement on the matter of privilege contains a complaint, but falls short of meeting the standards as outlined in the authorities which describe a deliberate misleading of the House with documents that may have been "forged, falsified or fabricated", 199, 206, 216-217.

This is clearly a disagreement as to facts; Under these circumstances, and in light of the documentation filed, matter of privilege is based on a misconception, 199, 206, 217-218.

Question and answer in statement does not qualify. Deputy was involved in Budget process but not in manner alleged by Member, 200, 206, 218-219.

Parliament has right to punish contempt that may have occurred in earlier Parliament, 217.
