Honourable Members:

On July 3rd last, the Honourable 2nd Member for Vancouver South rose on a matter of privilege concerning statements allegedly made by the Honourable Member for Skeena appearing in *The Province* newspaper dated July 3rd, 1980. The Honourable 2nd Member for Vancouver South read to the House the statements in question, tabled a copy of the publication and indicated to the House the motion which he intended to submit if permitted to do so.

I would have preferred not to occupy the Chair upon consideration of this matter but obvious circumstances do not permit otherwise. There is however a duty and ample precedent for the Speaker to remain in the Chair to put a question and to make rulings even when the matter affects himself personally. This has occurred on a number of occasions in other jurisdictions including Westminster (ref: Bourinot's Parliamentary Procedure, Fourth Edition, at page 179.)

I must therefore consider the statements attributed to the Honourable Member for Skeena and determine whether or not a *prima facie* case of breach of privilege has occurred and be satisfied that there has been no undue delay in making a complaint. On the latter question, I am so satisfied as the complaint was made in the House at the earliest opportunity on the same day as the publication of *The Province* newspaper, i.e., the 3rd day of July, 1980. Sir Erskine May's 16th edition at page 124, states that accusations of partiality in the Speaker's discharge of his duty have been held to constitute a breach of privilege and cites a number of examples of that offence. The alleged statements of the Honourable Member for Skeena which have been read to the House, on the face of them, do so reflect on the Chair and may be found to be an offence against the House in the person of its elected Speaker (Deputy) and I so rule. I therefore recognize the 2nd Member for Vancouver South.

21 Mr. *Skelly* asked the Hon. the Minister of Environment the following question:

Between January 1, 1976, and March 31, 1980, how many orders have been issued by the Director of Pollution Control, pursuant to section 13 (g), *Pollution Control Act*, R.S.B.C. 1979, chapter 332, to whom were the orders issued and for what reasons?

The Hon. C. S. Rogers replied as follows:

"I am advised that while records may not be entirely accurate, only one order is known to have been issued pursuant to section 13 (g) of the *Pollution Control Act.* This order was issued on April 27, 1978 to Pacific Coast Terminals Co. Ltd. to require the phase-out by December 31, 1978, of 13 untreated sanitary sewage discharges to the Fraser River at New Westminster which had been in existence for many years."

77 Mr. *Skelly* asked the Hon. the Minister of Environment the following questions:

1. What were the actual 1980 counts of elk in the East Kootenay as classified by cows, bulls, and calves as taken by flights over the region in February of each year?

2. What is the total number of elk in the East Kootenay this year as determined by Fish and Wildlife Branch counts?

3. What numbers of elk classified by bulls, cows, and calves are present in each of the following Management Units; MU 4-1, MU 4-2, MU 4-3, MU 4-20, MU 4-21, MU 4-22, MU 4-23, MU 4-24, MU 4-25, MU 4-26, and MU 4-34?

4. How many deer endorsements were authorized by the Fish and Wildlife Branch, Region 4, for 1979 and what were the harvest returns on these endorsements?

The Hon. C. S. Rogers replied as follows:

"1. Elk surveys undertaken in the East Kootenay in February–March 1980: Sighted 1,397 cows, 736 calves, and 156 bulls.

"2. According to Fish and Wildlife minimum population estimates for 1980, there are 12,005 elk in the East Kootenay.

"3. A detailed breakdown by bull, cow, and calf is unavailable. The minimum elk population estimates for 1980 in the Management Units specified are as follows: MU 4-1, 765; MU 4-2, 615; MU 4-3, 600; MU 4-20, 1,000; MU 4-21, 1,050; MU 4-22, 1,680; MU 4-23, 3,000; MU 4-24, 460; MU 4-25, 460; MU 4-26, 765; and MU 4-34, 460.

"4. Full data on deer endorsements in Region 4 for 1979 is not available. However, comparable data is available for 1978. In 1978, 2,220 deer endorsements were issued in Region 4. A total of 560 deer were taken by hunters with endorsements representing a success ratio of 28 per cent."

67 Mr. Stupich asked the Hon. the Minister of Finance the following question:

The 1980–81 Estimates show (page 7) under "Contributions From Other Governments" \$636,900,000 in Revenue in respect of Established Programs Financing. What is the portion of this total paid in respect of: (a) Hospital Insurance; (b) Medicare; (c) Extended Health Care; and (d) Post-secondary Education?

The Hon. H. A. Curtis replied as follows:

"The latest estimate of British Columbia's cash entitlement in respect of all four program areas together is \$636.9 million. The funds are given to the provinces without any condition that a certain amount must be spent on a given program; only that certain minimum national objectives, such as those concerning access and portability, are met. "The Federal Government has an allocating formula which is used to suggest an allocation of funds among the various components of the established programs but this is more properly thought of as a procedure for satisfying federal administrative requirements than as any sort of guideline for the provinces. There is nothing obligatory about the federal allocation among the major programs, it is simply a reflection of the proportional national spending patterns on those programs in 1975–76, the base year for calculating EPF payments. It did not, does not, and need not correspond to British Columbia spending on these programs.

"The allocation to British Columbia under this federal administrative formula is as follows:

The Hon. H. A. Curtis replied as follows:

"1. The estimated 1980–81 value of the tax transfer portion of the Established Programs Financing package is as follows: \$

"2 and 3. No portion of the tax transfer component of the EPF arrangement is attributable to any specific program. Funds raised through this part of EPF are indistinguishable from any other personal or corporate income taxes raised by the Province.

"Although the tax points were given in compensation for Federal cost sharing for specific programs, under the current arrangements there is no legal obligation to spend the funds on those programs, notwithstanding provincial compliance with certain national conditions.

"It should be noted that one tax point and the escalated 1975–76 value of a tax point were given to the provinces in partial compensation for the termination of the old revenue guarantee. The Federal Government calculates this transfer as part of the EPF arrangements but actually it should be subtracted from the value of cash and tax points to arrive at the true value of the package in respect of the established programs. The estimated amount to be subtracted in 1980–81 is \$70.5 million."

By leave, on the motion of Mrs. *Wallace*, Bill (No. M 214) intituled *Ground-water Licensing Act* was introduced, read a first time, and *Ordered* to be placed on the Orders of the Day for second reading at the next sitting after today.

Mr. Speaker delivered the following statement:

Honourable Members:

Earlier today the Honourable Member for North Vancouver-Capilano rose on a point of order and informed the House that a Select Standing Committee, namely, on Public Accounts and Economic Affairs, of which the Honourable Member is Secretary, purported to hold a meeting this morning during a sitting of the House. The Honourable Member and others sought guidance from the Chair as to whether or not the Committee in question could validly convene itself without leave of the House.

A ruling of the Speaker recorded in the Journals of 1973 at pages 193 to 195 quite clearly holds that without leave a Committee has no power to sit while the House is sitting and accordingly the proceedings of any Committee doing so must be treated as a nullity. The authority for this ruling is to be found in Sir Erskine May, 18th edition, at page 626 and in Commons Journals (Westminster) (1693–97), volume 126, at page 494. I also note in the Fourth Edition of Bourinot's Parliamentary Procedure at page 466, it is stated:

> "Committees are not permitted to sit and transact business during the sittings of the Canadian Commons, without obtaining special leave therefor, upon a report asking for such leave."

This is in conformity with our practice which follows the English procedure as it was prior to the adoption of Standing Orders which are not applicable to this House.

Mr. Speaker delivered the following Ruling:

Honourable Members:

Yesterday, the Honourable Leader of the Opposition sought a ruling from the Chair as to whether or not the House could properly proceed with a certain Bill now on Orders of the Day for second reading. It should first be observed that any discussion of the content of a Bill on the Order Paper is generally not in order during other proceedings in the House. Such discussion, if allowed, would offend the rule of anticipation (May, 16th edition, page 404; Beauchesne, 4th edition, page 148, clause (v)).

The Honourable Leader, in raising his point of order, quoted from the 19th edition of May at page 754 under the heading "Matters Requiring the Queen's Recommendation" "Moneys to be provided by Parliament". This reference confirms the necessity of any measure which provides for the appropriation of public revenues being initiated by recommendation of the Crown. This is a fundamental principle established some 250 years ago in the British House of Commons to the effect that financial Bills and resolutions must come to the House by Message recommending the same. This constitutional requirement is imposed on all Legislatures of the Dominion of Canada by section 90 of the *British North America Act*, and on British Columbia, section 10 of the Terms of Union by which British Columbia became a Province, and it reads as follows:

"It shall not be lawful for the House of Commons to adopt or pass any Vote, Resolution, Address, or Bill for the appropriation of any part of the public revenue, or any tax or impost, to any purpose that has not been first recommended to that House by Message of the Governor-General in the Session in which such Vote, Resolution, Address, or Bill is proposed."

This principle is incorporated in our Standing Order 67 which provides:

"It shall not be lawful for the House to adopt or pass any vote, resolution, address, or Bill for the appropriation of any part of the public revenue, or of any tax or impost, to any purpose that has not been first recommended to the House by Message of the Lieutenant-Governor in the Session in which such vote, resolution, address, or Bill is proposed."

The Bill in question was introduced on a Message recommendation from His Honour the Administrator on July 29th last, in conformity with Standing Order 67. Procedurally, therefore, the House correctly has possession of the Bill. The merits or otherwise of the method of appropriation of public revenue contained in the Bill is for the House to make a determination upon in due course. Any legal question arising during the passage of a Bill has been ruled to be one for the Courts and not for the Speaker (Speakers' 1916 Decisions, Volume II, page 22).
