PETITION.

To the Honourable the Legislature of the Province of British Columbia, in Parliament assembled:

The petition of Warburton Pike, of Saturna Island, in the Province of British Columbia, humbly sheweth:—

That it is in the interest of the public that communication should be opened up by railway between the waters of the Stickeen River and headwaters of the Dease River.

That your petitioner is desirous of undertaking the construction and operation of such railway, and other works hereinafter mentioned.

Wherefore, your petitioner humbly prays that your Honourable Body will be pleased to pass an Act incorporating your petitioner, and such other parties as may hereafter become shareholders, as a Company for the purpose of constructing, equipping and operating a line of railway, of standard or narrow gauge, from some point on the Stickeen River to a point on or near Dease Lake, in the District of Cassiar, with power to extend to the Northern and Eastern confines of British Columbia, and construct and operate branch lines and telegraph and telephone lines, and to construct and maintain wharves, docks and warehouses, to expropriate lands for the above purposes, together with all other usual, necessary or incidental powers in the premises.

And your petitioner, as in duty bound, will ever pray, etc.
