
PETITION.

To the Honourable the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, in Parliament assembled:

The petition of Charles Thomas Dupont and Frederick Bernard Pemberton, both of the City of Victoria, humbly sheweth:—

That it is in the interest of the public that a line of railway should be constructed and operated from a point on the International Boundary Line on the right fork of Sheep Creek, in the Province of British Columbia, thence running north along the said creek to the Trail Creek Mines, or more particularly to Red Mountain, with branch lines to the mines adjacent thereto.

That your petitioners are desirous of being incorporated as a company for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating such a line of railway, with power to construct, maintain and operate branch lines to any mine or mines adjacent to the said line of railway; and with power to build wharves and docks, and to erect and maintain telegraph and telephone lines, and generally to do all things necessary and incidental or conducive to the attainment of the above purposes or any of them.

Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Honourable House will be pleased to pass an Act incorporating your petitioners as a company, and conferring upon them the powers above set forth or referred to.

And your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray.
